Letter from the Minister

Dear all,

Last time I wrote this letter, late in February, I mentioned that the daffodils were just beginning to appear up at Holebottom. Now, just a very few weeks later, they're almost finished. That would be quite sad, if it weren't that — after what has felt like a very long time — leaves and buds are really making themselves unmissable now. The field is still a quagmire, so we're still wearing wellies whenever we're there, but I'm starting to be convinced that one day it'll be normal shoes again, and then, even if only for a short while, we'll be able to be up there in sandals.

It's been a gloriously busy time at church since the last Calendar. In early March we celebrated the fiftieth anniversary of the official opening of the beautiful building we get to call home, and it was a lovely weekend. The tea party on the Saturday was thoroughly enjoyable: there were nearly fifty people there, and not only did we share a delicious tea, but there was a definite 'buzz' about the place, and it felt like our community teas pre-Covid (it's hard to believe that this month marks the fourth anniversary of the first lockdown!). The tea didn't happen without a lot of work from dedicated and hardworking people, and I'm grateful to all of them.

And on the Sunday we held our Anniversary Service (which, again, didn't happen without a lot of work!), in the presence of guests including the Deputy Mayor of Bury, and his consort. It was a real privilege to have so many people at the service who'd been at the Service of Dedication in 1974, and to know that there are people here who have loved this building for the whole of its life. It was especially moving that we had input from all of the ministers who've served here: three of us in person, and one by means of a written message. We are really lucky to have this building, and to have a church to inhabit it!

Most of you will receive this Calendar over Easter weekend (with some of you getting it later because of the post), and it seems a bit obvious to say that that's another huge weekend in the life of any church. Even though, as Unitarians, we don't generally have the same beliefs as our Trinitarian

siblings, I think almost all Unitarian congregations take Easter seriously and mark it with a degree of importance. Just like Christmas, it always feels to me as though Easter is actually many many different festivals all rolled into one, and that what it really marks is the unstoppable power of the light, the turning of the year, and the visible reawakening of things which were already wide awake and working hard, but hidden from us.

In early April, several members of the congregation will be attending the Annual Meetings of the General Assembly of Unitarian and Free Christian Churches (normally referred to, for obvious reasons, as "the GA"). We don't have formal delegates this year, which means that we don't get to vote on the Motions which are put before the meeting, but I'm still glad that we will be represented as a congregation, even if not formally.

The GA gatherings are a great time to meet other Unitarians from different congregations, districts, and countries, and to hear more about what is going on in this unique denomination of ours. There is always a huge range of workshops to pick from, and one of the highlights for me (unsurprisingly, perhaps, given that I'm a minister) is the variety of worship which is available. I always particularly love the Anniversary Service: it was an Anniversary Service at Hatfield some time in the early 2000's that finally cemented for me that I wanted to remain in Unitarianism (my call to ministry came later, and that's another story, maybe!). There is always something truly nourishing and uplifting about singing together with 300 other Unitarians, and if you're considering attending next year, I really would encourage you. It's also very exhausting (physically, spiritually, and emotionally) so if you want encouragement from any of the people who will be there, it might be wise to give them a few days after their return, so that they might have some energy back!

I wish you all a (nearly but not quite late) happy Easter, and I send you all the blessings of all the spring festivals. May the light continue to shine on us all!

Notes from the building.

We are heading into spring in a big way now and it will soon be time for me to put all of the paperwork I have been working on of late into the out-tray and look forward to getting on with work on the outside of the building again. There's a lot of work that has been left a little too long now, and its really beginning to show. I have been wanting to replace the sealant around the windows on Back Saint Mary's Place for around three years and as its starting to slip and give way in places, the work has moved beyond 'needs to be done' and entered the 'actually worrying me a bit' stage.

It's one of those jobs that has to be done now, and it's one of those jobs I have to figure out how to get done without it costing the church more than it should. That sounds straightforward really, but actually it is much harder than you might think.

If I were to do the work myself, it woud, I suspect, take me about eight hours and I would have to buy the sealant in bulk at the price it is sold to the public... alternatively I will need to spend quite a few hours, possibly more than it would take me to get the job done myself, to get quotes from contractors who can get the sealant much cheaper because they can buy at trade prices, in bulk.

What I will likely have to do is what I absolutely don't want: spend a lot of time and money on finding a contractor to quote for the work only to find I have to do the actual work myself because the labour costs don't cover the extra savings any contractor can offer me on sealant, but I suspect the potential for actual savings might really be there if only I can find the right contractor. It's a Catch 22, one that creates even more paperwork for me, but that is an unfortunate but necessary part of the process really.

What our building says to me: Acceptance

From the outside the rounded edges of the walls and low structure of the building give a sense of 'groundedness' here, not reaching to the heavens 'up there' or 'out there'.

Inside the People Praising sculpture, flanked by diverse colours, express a celebration and a welcome to ALL humanity. The symbol of the chalice is a cup for all and the flame burns bright as the spirit of life. So there is warmth, comfort and challenge.

There is acceptance.

But this is a reflection of someone has been inside the building and experienced the people and worship and spiritual presence within. This has illuminated my perception.

Assuming good weather, we will be holding a Fire Evacuation Practice on Sunday 14th April, straight after the Postlude: the alarm will sound and everyone (including stewards and people on tea- and coffee-duty) will be asked to evacuate the building.

Please familiarise yourself with the fire evacuation policy and fire safety instructions which are displayed on the notice board in the lounge.

It is really important that this evacuation includes people with mobility problems: so please be prepared to help one another as you would in a real emergency.

Ade and Howard will be on hand to assist and also to monitor how quickly safely we can empty the building.

Whilst we're outside anyway, we hope to take a congregational photo: it's been a while since we've done this.

If the weather is poor we will wait a week or so for the evacuation drill.

This pre-announced evacuation will be followed, probably in May or June, by an unannounced evacuation practice.
