SAD OR HAPPY?

Many people are diagnosed with a condition that is caused by a deprivation of natural light. Seasonal Affective Disorder (SAD) can bring symptoms of lethargy, drowsiness and even depression. It is at this, the darkest time of the year, that symptoms of this malady are most present. Humans have for many years attempted to cope with and interpret the shortest and darkest days of the year, and religion has been but one sphere in which people have sought effective antidotes. Our Roman ancestors observed the festival of Saturnalia on 25 December, as they rightly noted that the days began to lengthen, and the sun would eventually offer its warmth and light in greater strength. It is no coincidence that Christianity chose to honour the birth of Jesus of Nazareth on a date that was firmly established in the Pagan calendar, thus guaranteeing a seasonal bias in favour of such celebrations. In English, the words "sun" and "son" are homonyms, thereby emphasising the shared nature of the holiday we share at this time each year.

My sister is badly affected by SAD, but I enjoy the dark, cold nights of the winter months, as I find them comforting and cosy, especially if a warm stew or baked pudding is to hand. Each of us responds to the outward signs of the season in ways that are unique to each person, but all around us are the festivities of Chanukah, Christmas, the Winter Solstice, and the inevitable round of Christmas shopping/January sales. As members of a faith tradition that celebrates diversity, particularly in the realm of religious practice, we can savour the months of December and January as opportunities to learn about the faith of others and re-examine our own deeply held convictions. In the midst of the darkness, I hope that we discover some light shed on the perspective of our neighbours, and derive great joy from the days (and nights!) ahead.

Survey of hymns in Sing Your Faith

Janet and I should like to thank the congregation for completing a survey of the hymns we sang from our new hymn book during the service on 15th November. We give a summary of the results in the table below and we shall pin up the details in the lounge at Church. We received 35 questionnaires although not every person had given a score to the words and tunes of every hymn. This was taken into account when the averages were computed.

What is clear is that the often quoted remark, the Bury congregation is opposed to change, is not borne out by our survey. Many people scored all the hymns quite highly and the completely new hymn, hymn 179 with new words and new tune, scored very well. Within the details of the results one can see that there are a small number of people who are less happy with the new hymn book.

The overall winner, with the highest total of the two averages (4.14+4.63), was hymn 32 with hymns 196 and 179 coming in second and third respectively. But statistically there was very little to choose between these three hymns. The least popular, by some margin, was hymn 216.

On the whole the words were less popular than the tunes. This might have been expected since for six of the hymns the tunes were familiar to most people. From comments made after the service some people gave poor marks to some words because they did not fit the tune very well while others gave poor marks if they just did not like what the words were saying.

One or two people added useful remarks on their survey. I particularly appreciated the person who gave a 5 to the children's story. Thank you whoever you are.
