During November, the year's figures for Traidcraft were drawn up; in 2015, goods to the value of £1,382.70 were sold; the sum of £150.00 was paid to the Treasurer, as profit, and £200.00 worth of coffee and tea was supplied to the church; all the stock is paid for. Since Traidcraft first began to operate, approximately 11 years ago, clear profit for the church of £1, 956.76 has been handed over.

Thank you to everyone who continues to support the Fair Trade initiative in this church; our efforts are consistently impressive; well done!

BURY LIGHT NIGHT

Once again, this was a very successful occasion, on which we entertained many visitors to the church; we had so many that we almost ran out of hotpot and black peas! At least one visitor, on this occasion, attended a Sunday service, just to see what we did---a good outcome.

In Beryl's absence, Susan did sterling work in organising the entire event, for which we are very grateful. Thank you to everyone who helped on the evening, and also to those who came along; we seem to be gaining an excellent reputation both with the event's organisers and with the townsfolk of Bury.

BAZAAR

This was held on October 31st and was again a successful event; however, despite the vast quantities of goods for sale, customers were in short supply, and we spent a considerable time not only setting up stalls beforehand but also clearing up and disposing of unwanted items afterwards. The Assessment Meeting, on November 2nd, provided a good opportunity for discussion about the future of the Bazaar, and this will be explored thoroughly during the next few months. Perhaps it is time for a change---a new formula---but, if so, what should we choose as a replacement for the Bazaar? We need to ask the opinions of the whole congregation, in order to work out the best way forward. Please give this subject some thought; the Meeting-notes from November 2nd are displayed on the notice-board.

STEWARDING

As we begin a new year, just a reminder that we have two regular lettings, every week, for which we require stewards. If you are able to steward Yoga-sessions, on Mondays, please speak to Derek Worthington; if you can help with AA meetings, on Wednesdays, the person to speak to is Margaret Fitzpatrick. Wednesdays are frequently quite difficult to fill, so please examine your new diaries and calendars and see whether you are able to offer to oversee a session or two. The Wednesday letting alone brings in over £1,000 per year. If you have not stewarded before, please think about offering now. In both cases, there are lists on the notice-

board. The more volunteers we have, the fewer times each person has to turn out. Thank you to everyone who has assisted with stewarding during 2015.

REMEMBRANCE

This year's Remembrance Sunday's service was devoted to celebrating the efforts of the 3 arms of defence in this country: the Air Force, the Army, and the Navy. Each of the three sections contained an appropriate hymn and reading, and there were details of Unitarians from Bank Street, Chesham, and Heywood, who had given their lives in the World Wars. Pam Oxley, very appropriately dressed in her poppy-red coat, laid the wreath, and the church was again decorated with felt poppies, each of which commemorated a specific life lost.

Beryl has now completed her research into those of our former members who served in the World Wars; the information is now in book-form, beautifully-bound in red, with golden lettering, and this is Beryl's gift to the congregation.

During the service, the book was presented to Susan Holt and Anne Mills, and Beryl was thanked for her generosity and all her efforts; the book has been almost two years in the making; progress has been, at times, difficult and slow, and the revelations, in the process, were emotional---even harrowing. This is a book to be treasured---a unique record that we must be proud to possess. (The copy has now been placed in the glass-topped display-case, at the back of the church, and the pages will be turned over regularly, so that everyone will have an opportunity to see it. There will also be an unbound copy in the foyer bookcase, if people wish to inspect it; please do not remove this from the premises. An additional copy has gone to The Fusiliers' Museum, for their archives, and there are plans to transfer the information from the book to our website, in due course.) Details concerning our book of Remembrance are now available on our web-site.

Remembrance Day brought a more intimate shared act of worship, which proved both emotional and moving. The felt poppies were strewn down the steps of the dais, under the red candle, and provided a focus for our thoughts. We were asked to remember all those who had fought in the conflict of the two World Wars---those who survived, those who died, those who were wounded, and those whom we considered our enemies. These were people who were called upon to embrace the concepts of courage, fear and honour. One of the readings described the very first Armistice ceremonies, in 1919---the first service at the new Cenotaph, in Whitehall, and the unveiling of the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. What must it have been like, to be present at these events, with memories of war so recent and everpresent? The writer says that "the very stones cried out"---almost unbearable to hear, and painful to read out, but so important to acknowledge.

PARKING

During the week, we retain only the two car-parking spaces immediately adjacent to the side of the church for our own use. On occasions, people with no connection to the church park there, which is annoying; if you are aware of such parking, please speak to Anne or Beryl. It is also important that church-members do not monopolise the two spaces; we request, therefore, that parking at the side of the church is restricted to those who are actually inside the church, and on churchbusiness, and that parking-time is kept to a minimum. Thank you.

BOOK CLUB

The Book Club will not meet in December. In January we will meet on Monday 25 at 7pm. The book to be discussed will be in the lounge cupboard from Thursday 4 December, all being well. New people are always welcome – if you enjoy a good read come along and see what happens. We usually talk for about an hour and enjoy some light refreshments.

STOP PRESS: FROM CHURCH COUNCIL

We still have not settled the matter of the two delegates we wish to send to the GA AGM's; the deadline has been extended until the end of the year; if anyone would like to volunteer to represent our church on this important occasion, please speak to Anne or Betty; the meetings will be held between March 30th and April 2nd, at the Birmingham Hilton. Please consider attending; it is a worthwhile experience.

Council has now considered the report from the group which met to assess this year's Bazaar; the general feeling seems to be that it is time we had a change. In the New Year, we will put a Suggestions Box either in the foyer or in the lounge; please feel free to express your opinions: is a Bazaar still feasible, or should it be replaced by some other form of fund-raising, and, if so, what should we choose? We would like everyone in the congregation to be involved in this decision; this matter will be discussed further at the February Council Meeting.

The President of the GA, John Clifford, wrote to us, some time ago, to ask whether we were willing to support efforts to alleviate the effects of the refugee-crisis in Europe; Unitarian churches in Hungary and Germany are looking after vast numbers of refugees and are desperately seeking financial help. Council has decided to request donations, both at the Carols By Candlelight Service, on December 13th, and at our Christmas Lunch, on December 20th. Any money collected will be divide between the two countries which need our help. Please give generously!

Derek and Freda Worthington have decided to relocate to South Manchester and will probably be moving in the New Year. We shall be sorry to see them go and will miss them; we hope they will come back and see us as often as they can possibly manage, and we send very best wishes to both of them for the future.

Both Derek and Freda do a great deal for this church, and there will be several jobs which will now need to be handled by others. George Scaife has already volunteered to run the 100 Club, but we also need people to deal with Gift Aid, the organisation of the Music Exams, and the operation of the Yoga Stewarding rota. Derek has all these tasks well in hand and will help his successors as much as he can; Gift Aid is quite straightforward but needs to be run by someone who is computer-literate. Freda has been our Assistant Treasurer for some years now, and we will need to replace her sooner, rather than later. If you are able to help, please speak to Anne or Betty. Many thanks to Derek and Freda for all they do, and have done, for us.
