BURY STREET KITCHEN

As you may well know, the Ministry Support Group and the church officers agreed that, for a trial period, the Bury Street Kitchen could use the church lounge one evening a week. This was initially on a Thursday, but it was rightly pointed out that we have several events on occasional Thursday evenings, so it has now changed to a Tuesday.

The group has met in the church three times now, and it has been a great privilege to open our church home for them. It makes all the difference for people to meet indoors, in the warm, and to have the chance to talk properly.

This arrangement will be discussed further at the next Church Council, and Kate very much hopes that we can continue to provide this much appreciated service at least one evening a week, and at least while the weather is so cold.

THE MINISTER'S 'WEEKLY PLANS'

As you will know, the minister publishes her weekly plans in the Order of Service each week. Just to clarify, these plans are a very rough idea of what she is doing. A day which is down as 'working from home,' for instance, will often involve a pastoral visit or phone calls instead, and her plans often change according to the needs of the congregation. This includes days off: if a need arises when the plan says the minister is on a day off (and assuming she is in Bury), she is always happy to change those plans. Please always err on the side of contacting her rather than not contacting her.

Many thanks to Jean for her help in running the stall, this year, and also to those who have supported fair trade; your efforts help so many people in developing countries to lead somewhat better lives, and every item purchased makes a difference.

Traidcraft has recently announced that it will be continuing to trade, after all; an independent assessment has advised that its operation should be considerably scaled down, and, at present, it seems that the company is to concentrate on selling basic foodstuffs, plus a few crafts; staff-numbers at headquarters, in Gateshead, will be reduced from 67 to 12. Our stall will certainly continue, although some lines may become unavailable; time will tell, but there could well be changes in store. Please continue to support fair trade, as this is the best way in which to help.

THANKS

Thank you to Val Chamberlain for leading our service on 28th October on the theme of *Words: losing and finding.*

Words are integral to our perception, understanding and appreciation of the world in which we live. For words to 'no longer exist' which we may have grown up with, yet current generations of children don't have access to (through the deletion of them from the junior dictionary) alters awareness and therefore alters appreciation. Val asked the question – without the words can we really care; a challenging thought! We were also prompted to think about how words help us to identify with our feelings both good and bad; and to consider the impact that not having access to this form of expression can have on mental wellbeing. The examples taken from the psalms and the poem *Pied Beauty* highlighted the depth of feeling that words can express. A thing or feeling exists before we label it with a word, but maybe we were being asked to consider that without the word, can we really relate to it? Well done Val for a stimulating and professionally-delivered service. (and that was with the added pressure of being assessed as part of her worship studies course).

So.....CONGRATULATIONS VAL – Val has recently heard that she has successfully completed all elements of the Foundation Level of The Worship Studies Course. An excellent achievement for which she thanks us for our encouragement and interest.

REMEMBRANCE SUNDAY: LEST WE FORGET:

We commemorated the centenary of the end of World War 1, on three separate occasions, this year.

On November 10th, a small but enthusiastic group gathered to sing popular wartime songs. Ably accompanied on the piano by Steven Ramsay, we sang heartily---although we seemed to know choruses much better than verses! Anne's rendition of "Sam, Sam, pick up thy musket" was well-received. This was a light-hearted session, but none the less sincere in terms of the memories evoked.

Morning-service, the next day, began at our Cenotaph, on an extremely wet day. George read the familiar verses from Laurence Binyon's poem, "To the Fallen"; we listened to the strains of "The Last Post" and "Réveille"; we observed the Two Minutes' silence; and Roy Wilkinson, our oldest veteran, and Hope Maden-Hunter, our youngest and most aptly-named member, laid the wreath together, in a most touching ceremony. Once in church, we resumed our worship, which culminated in the reading out of our Roll of Honour---always an emotional moment. As the names were read, we were invited to collect a named poppy, each one representing a war-casualty from one of our constituent churches, and place it on the communion table, beside our Book of Remembrance. The poignancy of this ceremony seems to increase in intensity, each year, as we acknowledge what we owe to those who fought so that future generations might live in freedom and peace.

Later in the morning, a group of us gathered at our cemetery at Holebottom, to pay tribute to the two soldiers whose war-graves are to be found there: Arthur Ashworth and Harry Greenhalgh; their details are also recorded in our Book of Remembrance. We remembered the contribution of each man, as part of our quiet, personal observations, and each planted an individual poppy at both graves, during a brief period of silence.

To Kate, we express our thanks for both services; each was moving, yet dignified, as we united past memories and hopes for the future: those who lost their lives in wartime did not perish in vain.

INTERRMENT

On Saturday, 24th November the ashes of Edna Wilkinson were interred at the Garden of Remembrance at Ainsworth Unitarian Chapel. Reverend Beryl Allerton officiated.

MINISTER'S MESSAGE

Dear all,

I don't think I'm alone in thinking December has come early this year - certainly, it only seems yesterday we were complaining about the stifling summer weather and wondering if things would ever cool down.

But it is here: so first of all, I wish you all a very happy Christmas, and blessings into the new year.

Last month I was very proud to be with this community as we marked Remembrance Sunday in November: special thanks are due to Roy Wilkinson and Hope Maden-Hunter for their roles in laying the wreath at the war memorial. It was also an honour to visit Holebottom cemetery after the main service, where a group of a dozen or so of us laid poppies on the two war graves which are there, and, through those young men, remembered all of the thousands whose lives were ended or altered beyond all recognition during the wars. Having started this ceremony to mark the 100th anniversary of the armistice, it will now continue as an annual event.

Looking ahead, we are, of course, about to plunge into the advent and Christmas season. Details of Sunday services, and of some of the special events, are elsewhere in the calendar, so I only need to say here that Christmas is always glorious (and

tiring) in a church community, and that we have some exciting plans ahead. We will, of course, continue to worship together every Sunday at 11.15am: during this season of busyness and rushing, it's good to have something steady and reliable to lean on.

It's at periods like Christmas that you realise how hard people work in our community. So much goes on in church which couldn't happen without people giving up their time and efforts: without people's generosity the church would not be decorated, there would be no refreshments, no one would welcome people into the church, there would be no raffles, Fair Trade stall, 100 club draw, hymn numbers, and very little administration would get done. please know that the minister is very grateful for this - and for the jobs she's sure she's forgotten.

This last year has brought us our share of sadness and loss. We have lost beloved friends, and we mourn their absence and offer our love to their loved ones, particularly at this time of year. We have known illness and bereavement in our circle, and again, we pray for healing for everyone who is ill or grieving.

But we have also watched our young people grow and develop. We have welcomed new members into our numbers, and seen people take on new responsibilities. Like the rest of life, church life is a mixture of sadness and joy. But together we can support and hold each other through whatever comes to us.

As we mark the ending of 2018 and move into 2019, I hope that we will continue to be the loving and supportive community I know we can be, and I look forward to increasing and strengthening our community.
