TRAIDCRAFT

The stall will be open on February 4th and 18th; please ask Anne or Jean if you require items at other times. Last year's figures show a pleasing increase in sales; thank you to all who support the stall.

Further to Kate's service about Toilet-Twinning, on January 14th, please be aware that, by buying fairly-traded items, we can help to improve standards of living; Traidcraft's profits, for example, are returned to the groups which produce for them, and are used to help

people to help themselves, by supplying housing, and other buildings, water-supplies, drains, sewers, education, and health-education---all of which we take for granted but are barely accessible to those in developing countries; every sale makes such a difference to those who have so little.

We first began to sell Traidcraft on the last Sunday in November, 2003, and have sold at least £2,000' worth of goods, per year, ever since---a magnificent effort!

On March 4th, the middle Sunday of Fair Trade Fortnight, the service will concentrate on Fair Trade in Bury; there will be speakers from the Bury Group, and The Mayor and Leader of the Council will also be present. A selection of fairly-traded refreshments will be served after the service. Come and join us!

POST-CHRISTMAS

The Christmas Raffle raised a total of £220; thank you to everyone who supported this, and to the organisers, especially June.

The collection taken after Gordon and Veronica Walker's reading of "A Christmas Carol", plus the profit from the lunch, amounted to £142.00, which was divided equally between Prostate Cancer UK and Fortalice (in support of abused women and children); moreover, the donation to Prostate Cancer UK attracted matching-funding from a charitable foundation, so this doubled what we sent to them. Thank you to everyone who supported this event, to Susan for organising the lunch, to Anne for organising the performance, and to Gordon and Veronica for their generosity in reading to us, and for waiving a fee, in favour of donations.

MINISTER'S MESSAGE

Dear all,

One of the things I was told about when I was first looking at Bury for a ministry was the dampness of the weather: I don't think it's actually stopped raining for the last 48 hours, except when it wanted to snow! But that's January in England, and reports from Norfolk tell me that it's worse down there.

But it doesn't get in the way of how much I love living in Bury. Over the autumn and winter we had three separate sets of visitors (friends of mine from Norfolk twice, and Ade's parents over Christmas and the new year) and I definitely realised how proud I was to be able to show them a tiny bit of what Bury has to offer.

None of them escaped a visit to Slattery's (I don't know why no one told me about that the minute I arrived), but we've also had trips on the steam railway, the market (obviously), up to the Peel Tower, wandering round Ramsbottom, and investigating Bury itself. We also made it to the transport museum, finally, which was a real treat.

I think when you're used to somewhere it's easy to forget about some of what it has to offer - you always know you can do it another time - certainly there are places in Norwich I never did get round to visiting, or only visited once I knew I was leaving.

I wonder if that's the case about church as well? I've said before that I'd had no idea how glorious our church building was before I first visited (I've even confessed that before I saw it for the first time I assumed it was going to be ugly!). I think we get used to what we've got, so it was lovely to get the opportunity to show off about the building and the way we use it in the colour issue of the Inquirer.

It was really lovely too, late last year, to spend part of a Worship, Communications, and Junior Church meeting discussing the attributes of our youngest members, so that their annual prizes could be personal. It's easy to see "the children" as a big mass of small people, but it was a treat to be able to discuss them each as individuals, and to acknowledge that they're an active part of our community.

We're really lucky to have a junior church, and it's always a pleasure to see them joining in with everyone else. I'm sure I'm not the only one who's hugely grateful to the adults who give up their time and skills to spend time with them each week. Starting this year they are going to be staying in the service with the adults one Sunday a month, so the order of service will change slightly - so watch this space. I know you're always willing to accept change and experiments - and as always, I really hope you'll talk to me if there's anything you want to raise.

You'll have seen a clarification in the calendar about funerals, which I hope clears things up and sorts out any upset there was about it. Another clarification: although I am normally in the vestry on a Friday and you are very welcome to drop in, this is as well as other pastoral visits, not instead. I'm still trying to get to see everyone, and some people are needing more visits and phone calls than others: but please keep letting me know if you, or anyone else, would benefit from me calling round. I am always delighted to do that.

Finally, cold though it is, I'm sure I'm not alone in noticing that the days are definitely getting longer. Let's hold on to that thought and look forward to seeing sunshine again!

FUNERALS AT BURY UNITARIAN CHURCH

There seems to have been some confusion around the last article in the Calendar about arranging funerals at Bury Unitarian Church. I apologise for that.

Hopefully the following will clarify things:

It is very important to everyone at church that something as personal and important as a funeral is done in the way the deceased person, their family, and their loved ones want it to be.

As the settled minister, the first contact about funerals should be made with me.

We can then talk about the funeral, and when there are particular requests – for specific things in the service, or for it to happen somewhere else, or for someone else to lead the service, for instance – of course I will do my best to make those things happen.

If other people are contacted first, it gets very complicated.

So in a nutshell: please contact me first but please also know that your wishes, and those of the deceased person, are the primary concern.

If you want to discuss the situation any further, please speak to me about it: things are cleared up much more quickly if they're dealt with directly!
