TRAIDCRAFT

The stall will be open on February 3rd and February 17th; please ask Anne or Jean, if you need items at other times. Many thanks to Jean for her assistance with the stall during 2018, and to everyone who has bought goods, too; your continued support is valued---not least by those in developing countries, who work extremely hard to make a living for themselves and their families, and to improve both their quality of life and local conditions.

At the start of the New Year, Traidcraft announced that it was to seek a new location; staff-numbers have been severely reduced, and the company has entered a period of transition; 2019 will be a crucial year. The next new brochure will be available by the end of March, and further developments are awaited.

Sales for us, at church, rose during 2017 but dropped back slightly in 2018. However, all the bills have been paid, we are well-stocked, and we have a small amount of cash in hand. Profits from Traidcraft sales provided all the tea, coffee, hot chocolate and sugar that we use, which amounted to £275, last year, plus £114. Over the 14 years that Traidcraft has been sold at church, the clear profit to the church amounts to £2,727.

BELL CUPBOARD

Since work on our lift was completed and various tidying-up jobs carried out, the former Bell Cupboard (which is currently in the upstairs room) has been emptied. SUMMER SCHOOL

Some of you may be aware that every August the denomination runs a Summer School at Great Hucklow in Derbyshire. This year's event runs from $17^{th}-24^{th}$ August, and the overall theme is 'Theology in the Flesh'. Summer School is a chance to spend time in an intentional community, and is the highlight of the year for many Unitarians. Bursaries are available to offset the cost, and newcomers are always prioritised for these.

BURY HOMELESS PROJECT

As most of you know by now, we are now hosting the Bury Homeless Project street kitchen once a week.

The street kitchen is a project entirely run by volunteers, which provides hot meals to anyone in need in the local area. Most of the clients are homeless (some sleep rough, others are vulnerably housed), and a few are adequately housed but unable to afford to eat well regularly.

The numbers attending vary greatly: some weeks there are around eight people turning up needing food, and sometimes there have been nearly twenty.

All the food is provided by the project's volunteers, who take it in turns to provide stews and casseroles to eat immediately, and sandwiches, crisps, fruit, and sometimes cake for clients to take away. Tea and coffee, of course, flow abundantly. There is always a table or two of donated clothes, bags, sleeping bags, and toiletries, and these are always very welcome.

The food and the 'stuff' is, of course, vital to the people using the service. But nearly as important is the warmth, the shelter, and the opportunity to sit and chat – and to be treated like people who are deserving of these things: because everyone is deserving of these things.

As a church community we should be really pleased that we are able to offer our premises in this way: being a religious or spiritual community is about serving those who need us, and it is okay to be proud of what we do. Currently Adrian and I are in the building whilst the street kitchen are there: it may be that in time we won't need to provide regular stewarding (the place is

always left immaculate and the two main organisers won't accept anything less from the group). If you would be interested in opening up on the odd Tuesday evening though, you would be made very welcome by the group. You will find a noisy, happy, laughter-filled atmosphere, and they make a very good cup of tea.

MAILING LIST:

Many of you will already be receiving the weekly notices by email: people have said they find this useful, particularly if they have not been at church. If you currently get the notices and don't want to, or if you've somehow been missed off the list but would like to get them, please just let Kate know and she'll arrange it.

RITES OF PASSAGE:

We are very pleased that in April we will be hosting the wedding of Candice and Suzanne: we think this will be the first same-sex wedding in a church in Bury. As Kate will be away, the service will be conducted by Rev Cody Coyne. We also have the wedding of our own Lorraine and Pete in August, which is a very exciting occasion to have to look forward to.

CHARITY COLLECTIONS OVER CHRISTMAS

Kate would like to thank everyone for their contributions to the charity appeals over Christmas: as well as a very large Food Bank collection, we also gathered 157 pairs of socks: the street kitchen users were really grateful for these.

THANKS

Kate would like to help everyone who helped in any way in all the services and events over the Christmas period. These things really are a team effort. She would particularly like to thank people for being around so that the street kitchen could be here on Christmas Day (the stewards had an unexpectedly long day of it) and on the Friday after Christmas. It meant a lot to the service users and that, in turn, means a lot to Kate.

DELTA COURSE

Kate is hoping to run the Delta Course – a progressive alternative to the evangelical Alpha Course – sometime later in the Spring. Watch this space (or speak to Kate) for more details.

CONTEMPLATIVE WORSHIP

This month's contemplative worship session will take place on Tuesday 12th February, **at 2.30.** We are still playing with the timing of these sessions to ensure that as many people can attend as possible.

COMMUNION

There will be a communion service after the main service on Sunday 24th February. Everyone is welcome to join in this sharing of bread, wine, and community. The service lasts about twenty minutes.

IDEAS FOR SERVICES, CONTEMPLATIVE WORSHIP, AND WORKSHOPS If you have something you would like explored in a service, in contemplative worship, or as a workshop, Kate is always happy to take 'requests'.

PRIMARY ROOM

If you've used the Primary room, or if you've used the kitchen and 'spread' into the Primary, please could you make sure you clear it afterwards? The Junior Church helpers sometimes have to clear up before they can use the room on a Sunday morning, and that's not fair on them or the children.

VICTORIA WOOD STATUE

The statue of Victoria Wood is going to be unveiled sometime in May, and we hope to be involved in some way. We'll keep you posted when the organisers have more information (like, for instance, a date!).

MINISTER'S MESSAGE

Dear all,

Welcome to 2019, and a slightly belated Happy New Year to you all. I hope everyone managed some rest and a sense of the sacred over the holidays. Most of you will know that this year is our 300th anniversary as a congregation. Obviously, we have been in this building for less than fifty of those years, but it is still a hugely significant anniversary. We will be marking it in various ways throughout the year, but with a particular effort in December, which marks the actual anniversary. It's incredible to think how we've grown and changed even in the fifty years in this building, let alone in the 300 years since we first gathered as a community.

I would like to thank everyone who worked so hard to make advent and Christmas so special at church: we had a lovely mix of worship and social activities, and were able to find time to support other people as well. I think we can truly say we did what a church is there to do.

We have already marked our young people's achievements over 2018, with their prizegiving on the first Sunday in January. We are very lucky to have them amongst us, and particularly lucky that we have skilled people to lead them. It's particularly lovely to see them joining in with worship and helping out with some of the things which make services flow so well.

Children watch and learn from the grown-ups they're around and I like to think that what they see from us is a good grounding for their future. Now that we've moved from giving prizes for attendance to making note of individual strengths in the children, I hope we can continue to see them as individuals with strengths and needs, just as much as we are. And whilst we're looking out for the positive in our young people, perhaps we could make a point of mentally clocking something positive about each of the adults in the congregation as well!

I have written elsewhere in the calendar about the street kitchen and how delighted I am that we are able to support it by offering our premises once a week: I'm particularly grateful that (thanks to other people) we were able to offer them use of the building on Christmas Day.

The things we do for those who are not a part of our community, and particularly those who struggle to feel part of the community as a whole, are how we show our strengths.

As I write it is snowing: let's hope that the cold and slippery snap doesn't last long. Even despite the snow, I heard loud birdsong from the cemetery earlier, and the place I stayed in just over a week or so was carpeted with snowdrops, so we do know spring isn't far away!
