### NOTES FROM JUNE CHURCH COUNCIL MEETING

Presentations were made to retiring organist, Harry Taylor, and to Roan Hodgson, on April 29<sup>th</sup>. Until we are in a position to appoint a permanent organist, we shall have visiting musicians, each Sunday; so far, the standard has been high---a pleasing and encouraging situation. Thanks to Margaret Fitzpatrick and to Betty Kenyon, who have agreed to deal with Lettings and Correspondence, respectively.

<u>Finance:</u> The plaque in the foyer is to be updated, to reflect the end of Jeff's ministry and the start of Beryl's. Surplus paint is to be removed from the loft, as it constitutes a fire-hazard. Our Risk Assessment document is to be reviewed by a team consisting of Roger Mills, Howard Maden, Marc Peters and Derek Worthington.

<u>The Treasurer</u> reports that, so far, income and expenditure are in line with the budget he prepared. However, we now have to pay our visiting musicians, each week, and this is an additional expense.

**Efforts:** Recent concerts have been both successful and enjoyable. The next event is the Barbecue, on August 4<sup>th</sup>. The Christmas Concert, with Minster Brass, will take place on December 1<sup>st</sup>

<u>Communications and Worship, with Young People:</u> 170 vests and 40 beanies were sent off to The Loving Hands Foundation at the conclusion of the very successful Fish and Chip Babies' Project. The GA President, Lis Dyson-Jones, is to visit us on December 9<sup>th</sup>.

<u>The Minister</u> reported a continuing heavy load of pastoral work, with 10-12 visits per week. She was pleased with recent successful social-events, and with the inspirational music experienced in church.

<u>Charity:</u> The next event will be a Strawberry "Tea at Molly's", on July 7<sup>th</sup>; the Samaritans' Youth Group are to help, on the day, and this will include a presentation outlining the work they do. Colin Smith is happy to receive money from collection-boxes, at any time.

<u>The next meeting</u> will be held on Monday, August 13<sup>th</sup>, at 7 p.m. All Council- members are reminded to make a note of this, as well as of the sub-committee meetings they are due to attend.

First and foremost, I must thank Beryl, on behalf of the congregation, for organising the events of our Jubilee weekend. ### PERFORMANCE LICENCE RESTRICTIONS

Following changes to the way in which Public Performance Licensing is structured, we have had to make decisions about which licences we buy for our premises. From April, this year, we are no longer licensed to use commercially pre-recorded music in church, except during worship. This mainly affects the playing of recorded music, in the worship-area, during Saturday coffee-morning sessions. We hope to be able to offer alternative music, in due course, including the CD's of "Sing Your Faith", which are already covered and, therefore, allowable. Please do not infringe the licensing-regulations; if in doubt, check.

### **G.A. WEEKEND**

This is to be held between June 29<sup>th</sup> and July 1<sup>st</sup>, this year, but, as we have no service on July 1<sup>st</sup>, the collection for the G.A. will take place, instead, on July 8<sup>th</sup>. Special envelopes will be available then. A message from the G.A. President, Lis Dyson-Jones has been pinned on the notice-board for everyone to read.

## **HARVEST**

This is an advance notice of the date: our Harvest Festival will take place on October 7<sup>th</sup>; on the previous evening, October 6<sup>th</sup>, Tony Berry will give a concert, which should be both entertaining and enjoyable. We are requesting a few, good raffle-prizes; if you are willing to contribute an item, please see June Clarke.

### LOUNGE-CHAIRS

We are considering some changes to the way in which the easy chairs in the lounge are set out. Also, there have been requests from some of our members that the higher easy chairs, especially the gold ones, should be left unoccupied, so that people who require the extra support they offer may use them. This would be greatly appreciated; thank you.

### **GENERAL SECURITY**

Two incidents, during the weekend of June 9th and 10th, have caused me concern, and information needs to be passed on, so that we are all alert to potential problems. On the Saturday morning, a young man came into the church, seeking the Minister; his real purpose was to ask for money. Whilst appreciating that we all wish to help those less fortunate than ourselves, it is probably a better idea to offer goods in kind (a cup of coffee, or the use of the telephone, for example) than cash.

On the Sunday morning, two young women entered the worship-area, at the start of the service, and sat at the back; they did not participate in the worship and twice left, to go into the lounge; they were joined in church by a young man, who also left early, and went upstairs. Fortunately, all three exited by the main door, and I was satisfied that no harm had been done. However, the behaviour of these people was not only disruptive but suspicious.

I think we all need to be vigilant, and this applies especially to the stewards. If you are on duty, please be aware of what is happening throughout the entire service, and take appropriate action; someone may feel unwell, be short of a hymnbook, or need a glass of water. If there is a problem, enlist the help of others in the congregation, as necessary.
