THANK YOU MOLLY

On Sunday, May 14th, a special presentation was made to Molly Ratcliffe by Chairman of the Congregation, Anne Mills.

Very early in the history of the new Bury Unitarian Church, Molly volunteered to provide a floral display for the church, each week, for three years; this was in 1974. Her promise has never been renewed, and, 40 years after the initial period expired, Molly has continued to provide flowers in abundance---for Sunday services, on special occasions, and for particular events; the Bury congregation has been privileged to enjoy all Molly's arrangements, and has admired the decoration of the church for each Harvest Festival, on Remembrance Sundays, and each Christmas (when Molly also decorated our Christmas Tree, and, for a number of years organised a Christmas Tree Festival). Individual baskets of flowers have been supplied, each week, to be given to members who were to be cheered up, thanked, welcomed, or appreciated in any way. For many years, Molly also acted as Flower Fund Secretary, receiving donations, and working out when people could mark memorable occasions by contributing to church-flowers. Molly has always been on hand to help and advise others, to encourage them to decorate the church, by suggesting ideas and encouraging technique, yet leaving space for personal expression.

Molly was presented with a basket of flowers (for herself, for a change!) and with a voucher for Afternoon Tea for two, at a venue of her choice, as a token of gratitude for all her work; each creative arrangement has been marvellous in its artistry and inspiration.

Afterwards, she commented that she had thoroughly enjoyed all her flower-arranging duties; it had never seemed to be hard work---and she had been able to indulge herself at somebody else's expense! She added that her work had always felt worthwhile because everyone at Bury was very pleasant to deal with. The Bury congregation is indeed fortunate to be able to call upon so much talent, and lucky that it has always been so generously shared. Many thanks and very best wishes, Molly!

MINISTER'S MESSAGE

Dear all,

This month's piece for the newsletter is written with a very sad heart, following the horrible, incomprehensible incident in Manchester on Monday night. Incidents of this sort are always heartbreaking, and it is human nature that we are more concerned about them when they are nearer to home – and this incident was very near to home, both physically and in terms of its impact.

We already know that some of the victims were local – at least three of the people who were killed were from Bury, and one of the young men who remains very ill in hospital was also a local boy, and known to one of our members. I know that our hearts and our prayers go out to everyone effected by this incident, and that we will do anything in our power to do what we can to help and to try and create a world in which this sort of incident ceases.

But that's not easy. We talked in a recent service about how hard it is to act when we know we can't make everything better. We can't possibly take away the pain and devastation of those who lost friends and family members, or heal the physical or emotional wounds of those who survived but sustained injuries. Neither can we take away the guilt and loss of those who survived unhurt, including, of course, the young woman whose concert was targeted. We can't remove the horror and terror which will remain with those hundreds of people who rushed to help – whether professionally or because they were there and could.

We can feel helpless in these situations. And we are allowed to feel pain and grief and anger and to weep for what has happened – in fact, I would suggest that we *should* feel all those things, and that crying is appropriate.

But we're not helpless. A kind word to those who are affected. A message of support to those doing the hard and vital work of mending bodies and minds. All of those things are help. All of those things are showing love, and we are never helpless if we can show love.

It can feel as though these things happen all the time. And they do happen too often. But the fact that we respond to them with horror and heartbreak

shows that we are not broken. A world that grieves is a world that loves, and a world that loves is a world that is winning.

There are going to be difficult times ahead, in the next few weeks and months. There are those who will leap on this awful event as an excuse to blame an entire group of people. There will be people reacting with hatred and anger and calls for retribution.

We are better than that. We have to be better than that. One person, one individual, chose to do this thing. And the moment the news was out, we were already seeing dozens, hundreds, of people doing what they could to help. Other concert goers. Passersby. Homeless men who had been begging in the arena. The emergency services. Almost everyone reacted with love, with horror and with offers of support. Within minutes, local taxi drivers swarmed to be as near to the arena as they could, to get people away. Within an hour Manchester residents were offering rooms and cups of tea to those in need of them.

Manchester and the world responded with love to an action of hate. And that is not only what we must continue to do, it is what we must continue to look for. We must look for the helpers, and we must see ourselves in the helpers.

What happened is awful. It is unimaginable. It is not a thing which happens in the world we want to live in. And we can't make it go away.

But we can love. We can meet the hatred with love. In the days and weeks to come it may become clear what we need to do, and we must be willing to do it. But whatever it is, I know that it will have love at its core.

We must keep loving. If all we can do is send out love, we are helping.
