NOTES FROM 1974 (3)

The month of March, 1974, resonates with me, as members of my family play their small part in the history of the church. At the Congregational AGM, on March 28th, the Chairman, Bernard Haughton, paid tribute to his predecessor, Alex Rogers, and to all other deceased members of the Building Committee since its inception; one of those members was my father, George Sutherland, from Bank Street, who urged the congregation not to throw good money after bad and to take the sensible option of demolishing the old church; he died in August, 1971, without seeing the completion of the new church---a project which he had worked hard to support. In 1974, my mother, Rene, volunteered to become the church cleaner and, by March, was preparing to begin her new job. By then, also, my younger daughter, Diane, had been baptised---the first baby to be so in the new church; I still have her Baptism and Cradle Roll certificates, as well as those for my elder daughter, Helen, who was baptised in 1972, at George Street, by Rev. Jim McClelland. Jim also married me to Roger; we were the last Bank Street couple to be married at the old church, in August, 1968.

When the new congregation moved into the completed building, Church Secretary, Norman Haworth, commented that "1974 was undoubtedly the most momentous year in the lifetime of its present congregation." He was proud to announce that a colour film record had been made of the transition from old to new. An impressive Dedication of the Building and its Congregation was arranged for March 9th, and a sub-committee was set up to organise arrangements; the service, conducted by Rev. J. D. Allerton, fell

into three sections, to depict, in words and illustrations, the past, present and future of Unitarianism in Bury; in addition, the service included Responsive Reading and the Affirmation of the Congregation. This, in best Bury Unitarian tradition, was followed by a buffet, tickets for which were sold, and members were urged to buy these as soon as possible, as there might not be enough places for all who wished to attend. Mrs. E. S. Ainsworth offered to provide church-flowers for the occasion. It is recorded that the net cost to Church Council of all the celebrations was £52.67 (according to the internet---£383.79 in today's money).

As regards money in general, the Church Secretary reported that the new building had incurred vast costs; however, the final deficit on the building project was, pleasingly, comparatively minimal---between £1,100 and £2,000; once this had been paid, the sum of £22,841.85 was left in the Building Fund, as Barbara Ashworth was able to declare. Church-funds, already healthy, were further swelled by £9,000 from the sale of the Bank Street caretaker's house, 18 St. Mary's Place. Treasurer, Jack Crabtree, issued a stern warning, though: because of inflation, charges for gas, electricity, water and telephone were set to rise tremendously, and, in the light of this, the congregation were to be asked to reconsider their contributions to the church. Does this sound familiar?

NOTES FROM CHURCH COUNCIL: 10-02-14 at 7 pm

The delegates to the G.A. AGM's were confirmed as Betty Kenyon and Anne Mills.

The date of the Congregational AGM will be March 17th, at 7.30 p.m. Dates for Council meetings for the next year were provisionally arranged; all Council members will be notified.

The Memorial Garden at Holebottom is now finished and will be dedicated on Sunday, May 4th, at 2.30 p.m.

The Annual Report was read and approved.

<u>Finance:</u> NELUM will be arranging a First Aid course, in the summer, to which we will be invited to send 2 people. Quotes had been obtained for cleaning the cooker, and this will be put in hand. Prices had been obtained for 2 new water-heaters, which are to be purchased. £50 will be donated to the International Council for Unitarians and Universalists. Regular hirers will receive rebates, as a goodwill gesture. Changes to Gift Aid rules were discussed to determine whether the changes might be beneficial to us.

<u>The Treasurer</u> reported a healthy year-end balance, with a slightly higher surplus than projected; John was thanked for his efforts, both with the accounts and with the forecasts he produces.

Efforts: The Christmas Concert raised £456. The year's programme has been arranged. Joint meetings with the Charity Committee are resolving personnel issues.

Communications and Worship, with Young People:

The Junior Church are now_meeting in the Primary Room again. Junior Church holidays have been agreed. It is hoped that planters and bulbs will be in place for the service on March 9th. It has been agreed that, next year, there will be 2 levels of prizes (First and Encouragement).

<u>The Minister</u> reported that we are to be visited by organists from the North West Organists' Society, on 15-02-14; some of its members already play regularly for us. We need to look seriously at Growth, and meetings to consider this will be arranged in the summer; we must all commit to this. Funding for Junior Church members who wish to attend events at Hucklow needs to be made available; the children are our future, and, by encouraging them, we may create growth.

<u>Charity:</u> Arrangements are in hand for the Quiz; the rest of the year's programme has been planned. Muriel Bird, from Bleakholt, visited in February and outlined the Sanctuary's work.

NELUM: Concern was expressed that there had been no contact with the district's Executive Committee representative; a question will be raised at

the G.A. AGM's. A dinner is to be held at Rawtenstall Unitarian Church, on May 30th. Halliwell Road will close at Easter. We had received a document requesting our views on the Future of the Lay Pastor Category; the questions were very thoroughly discussed; Beryl will email our conclusions to Stephen Lingard.

<u>Membership Secretary:</u> Slips detailing individual contributions during 2013 are ready to be distributed.

<u>Correspondence</u>; G.A. Mailing; this contained a great deal of material about the G.A. AGM's and also notified us that there had been no nominations for Vice-President, this year. Michael Lord had written to say that he is to re-locate to the U.K. later this year.

A.O.B: It was decided that a new congregational photograph should be taken, this year.

The date of the next meeting will be Monday, 7 April 2014 at 7 pm.

TRAIDCRAFT

Fair Trade Fortnight begins on February 24th and ends on March 9th, this year. To celebrate the event, I shall be organising a Lunch, after the service, on March 9th, from 12.30 p.m. onwards; Beryl has kindly offered help, and soup, sandwiches and sweets will be served. This lunch is <u>free;</u> please sign the list on the notice-board to give us some idea of numbers, and to indicate your preference of sandwich-filling. The Co-operative have generously provided vouchers, to help with our costs, and I am pleased to acknowledge their contribution.

Lunch will be served in the upstairs room; please note that there will not be coffee after the service, on that day, but coffee will be available after the meal. The Traidcraft stall will be open, and I have ordered a great deal of new---and different---stock, which I hope everyone will view. There will also be a raffle with, of course, fairly-traded prizes.

After lunch, Roy Turner will show the film, "To rise like the Phoenix", which charts the transition from the old church, through George Street days, to the new one; this will begin at approximately 2 p.m. Please come along and support this venture; this part links with our 40th Anniversary Celebrations. MINISTER'S MONTH

The weather has been atrocious over the last few weeks, wet, wet and more wet. Then to add to that we had extremely strong winds and this was the last straw for the church roof which leaked and we had buckets strategically placed around the front of the church to catch the drips. The problem is not the rain but the wind, which, when in a certain direction, blows the water under the flashing. Despite the bad weather there has been relatively little real grumbling because I think we all recognise how lucky we are compared to others. I am sure we have all seen the terrible pictures of flooded homes and businesses and feel a great deal of sympathy for those affected.

A recent sermon about the need to look at church growth prompted quite a lot of comment in the lounge after the service. I think the main thing that people were questioning was, how, how do we encourage people into the church and into becoming member of the congregation. Firstly let me say that each year I have been here we have welcomed new members so that is a positive indication. Secondly let me say that people write books on church growth which are a rich source of ideas that can be adapted to particular situations. The beginning of this year is busy with lots happening so later in the year, when there is time, I hope that we can get together and discuss and put into action ideas that we feel could work for us.

The one way that is universally recognised as achieving growth is for people to invite family and friends to either social events or services, and to do this regularly so that they begin to feel part of the community. There are services which are particularly good to invite someone to, those with a popular theme such as music or friendship.

This year with the commemoration of the outbreak of the 1914-18 war people may well be looking for places where they can take part in commemorative services. Here at the church in August there will be a service at 11pm on the 4th at the time when war began. That service will be appropriate to that event and, with publicity, we hope will bring people into the church. That service and the Remembrance Service in November, which is so special this year, would both be a good time for members to invite someone to join us.

One very wet Saturday morning, in the middle of February, we welcomed members of the Rochdale Organists Association to come and look at, listen to and play our organ. Three of our organists are members and had suggested the visit. It was really good to welcome them and I think they and we enjoyed their visit. Though we are rich in organists having, at the moment, six to call on, it is always good to be known in the right places.

A planter with spring flowers has now been place under the external notice board and will soon carry a plaque saying that it is there to mark the church's 40th Anniversary. Hopefully it will be a cheerful reminder to those who pass that the church is here and is as cheerful as the spring flowers.
