### **MEDICAL DETECTION DOGS**

On Sunday, February 11th, we were visited by Alice, who works for the above charity; she gave a most informative talk about her work for this organisation, and was accompanied by Henry and Peanuts, two of MDD's trained dogs---who really stole the show!

MDD was founded in 2008 and is based in Milton Keynes; its patron is The Duchess of Cornwall, and its CEO is Dr. Claire Guest.

Some of the dogs work with people, to assist them---those who are blind or deaf, or who suffer from conditions such as Type 1 Diabetes, Addison's, or Parkinson's; in these cases, the dogs' presence may save lives, improve quality of life, or give greater independence to those whose lives have been seriously impaired by their illnesses.

The most ground-breaking work carried out, however, is done in research-labs, where the dogs' acute sense of smell is used to detect odours of disease, present in urine or in breath; dogs can be trained to find very early signs of cancers (particularly prostate cancer) and type 2 diabetes, amongst other illnesses. A dog's sense of smell is so finely-honed that it can detect half a teaspoonful of sugar in the amount of water contained in 3 Olympic-sized swimming-pools! Once it is accepted, after thorough testing, that dogs can help with the diagnosis of diseases, their skills may be used by the NHS, as part of its routine processes; such assistance will be reliable---it achieves 93%, at present; it will avoid invasive and painful surgical-procedures, and it will save time and money.

We have leaflets in the lounge which give information about the above charity; our Quiz, on March 10th, will devote half its proceeds to MDD, and the remainder to church-funds.

### PROSTATE CANCER SUPPORT GROUP

It is with regret that Howard and Jean Maden have taken the decision to disband the PCSG, which has been meeting on our premises, once a month, for several years now. Numbers of members have dwindled, and support from outside bodies has become non-existent.

Initially, the church Charity Committee set up the group and raised funds for it, and there is still money left in the group's account---just under £700.00, at present.

This matter was discussed at the February Church Council, and it has been decided that the remaining money will be donated to Prostate Cancer UK, via The Women's League National Project for 2017/18.

Council expressed its commiserations to Howard and Jean, and its appreciation of the time and effort they had devoted to running the group, in aid of a most worthwhile cause.

### **MINISTER'S MESSAGE**

### Dear all,

March is one of my favourite months – and not only because it's the month with my birthday in it (partly, to be fair, but not only).

It just feels like once we've reached March, we've done away with the worst of the winter. Obviously, it can still snow well into April (sometimes longer!) but even that doesn't stop that feeling of a burst of energy, and sense of hope. The clocks go forward (and normally someone turns up at church just as we're finishing); we pass the equinox so we know the days are going to be getting longer; and we approach Easter, which – even for the non-religious – acts as proof that the earth has done what it does best and turned on its axis.

And at church it brings our AGM. I've been really impressed at Bury at how willing people are to stand as officers, to join committees, and to act to support the work of the church. In my opening prayers for meetings recently I've been invoking the Quaker tradition of holding 'Meetings for Worship for Business'. Now, I'm not recommending the Quaker way of business: I remember too well being a teenage Quaker and sitting through seemingly endless meetings waiting for a consensus to arise (it's a beautiful way of doing business, but often a slow one), but I am recommending the spirit of that business: Quakers don't see their business meetings as something separate from their meetings for worship – they see them as extension of it. Our church is important to us, and the work we do midweek in the lounge matters.

I do hope there will be a good turnout for the AGM – important decisions are reached, and it's a good opportunity to hear the report of our year. It's amazing how much we've done, how hard we've worked, and how much we've enjoyed, and that isn't always easy to see when we're in the middle of doing it, working, and enjoying it.

We are also welcoming five new members this month, which is very exciting. Membership of a Unitarian church doesn't involve making statements of faith or belief; or pledging money (though we do value your financial contributions); or agreeing to stay forever; or to have 100% attendance. It involves making a statement that the church is where you have found a spiritual home, and that you feel yourself to be a part of the community.

I use the word 'welcoming' very deliberately. If there's one thing we excel at as a church it is our welcome to visitors. Every time I see someone new in the church, or in the lounge before or after the service, someone is talking to them. And 'to' them, not 'at' them. I know that two of our five new members came because of the welcome of two members when they happened to drop in midweek. And whilst it would be nice, as the minister, to kid myself that it's the sermon that keeps people coming back, it would also be dishonest: it's the welcome shown by everyone in the community that keeps people coming back.

And I'm particularly proud that we don't only do that to those who come on a Sunday morning – I know that people who come on a Saturday for coffee, or to social events, also feel welcome and a part of the community. Whatever else changes within our church – and things always change – I hope that never ever does!

On a practical matter, I am away for three shortish periods during March. I will, obviously, let you know the dates on the orders of services and in notices, but as on those occasions I will not be in reasonable reach of Bury, I will also ask one of my colleagues in the NELUM ministry team to be on hand in case of a pastoral need.

### COMMUNION.

As you probably know, there is an inclusive communion service on the last Sunday of each month. The service is a sacred sharing of bread and wine, in the spirit of community and love. Everyone is welcome, no matter what your religious background or belief. You definitely don't have to have been baptised or confirmed, and nothing magical happens to the bread or the wine. The services are short, at around 15 minutes, and they are very important to the small but committed group of people who attend regularly.

You are very welcome to join us.

This month there is a slight change: the minister is away on the last Sunday of March, so the communion will take place on Good Friday instead.

**CONTEMPLATIVE WORSHIP** Kate will be starting a series of contemplative worship session on the first Friday of each month, from March 2<sup>nd</sup> onwards. These will start at 6.15 (to allow for easier parking) and last about 45 minutes, followed by tea and cake.

Everyone is very welcome: the sessions will consist of recorded music, readings, and meditative contemplation. They are designed as a quiet thoughtful time to end the busy week gently.

**AFTERNOON TEA AT BOLTON, 10<sup>th</sup> April, 2.30pm.** All women (not just members of the Women's League) in the congregation are invited to afternoon tea with the women of Bank Street Bolton on Tuesday 10<sup>th</sup> April at 2.30pm.
