#### **COUNCIL NOTES 2.4.12**

All existing and new members were welcomed. Anne Evitts has volunteered to act as Minutes' Secretary, for the next three Council Meetings, to give time to seek a church Secretary. June Clarke and Margaret Miller were appointed as our NELUM Delegates. Quita Brooks has written thank us for donations sent in memory of Kenneth; the magnificent sum of £491.50 was raised in respect of the Send A Child to Hucklow 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Appeal.

<u>The Ballot</u> on conducting same-sex partnership-ceremonies did not produce sufficient agreement for these to be performed. Since there are now moves to introduce same-sex weddings, we will have to consider our views, in the light of this development. **Finance:** It is unclear at what point sub-committees begin their duties---after our AGM, or after the next Council meeting. To avoid future problems, the two will be held as close together as possible; ideally, sub-committees should not arrange to meet in the intervening period. It was agreed that we would not sponsor "The Inquirer", next Christmas; we will try to sponsor an issue per year, in future, but not necessarily at Christmas, and preferably when we have an item of interest to contribute. Wednesday bookings may mean that the cleaners cannot perform their duties, at their usual time, in which case, they should be informed beforehand.

<u>The Treasurer</u> has drawn up a budget for the next financial year and will produce a forecast to show how we are progressing.

**<u>Efforts</u>**: Tickets are on sale for the Radcliffe Male Voice Choir Concert. The leaflets of social and charity events have proved popular and helpful.

**Communications and Worship, with Young People:** The new publicity-leaflets have been well-received; one is already available, but the cover of the other has not yet been finalised.

<u>The Minister:</u> Several special services had been held, and judged successful. Pastoral work has been especially heavy, recently.

**Charity:** The Sunshine Smarties effort is going well. The Young Samaritans' Group wished to hold a concert in May; however, the dates suggested were not suitable, so a rethink is needed. Satur-day-evening lettings **must** be approved by Council, and, if the worship-area is used, it must be returned to a suitable state for the Sunday-morning service.

**Membership Secretary:** Lorraine Maden was approved as a new member.

<u>Members</u> were allocated to sub-committees; a full list should be available soon. The dates of the next meeting of each sub-committee

were given, as were dates for the next year's Council Meetings. <u>Council will next meet on 11-6-12, at 7 p.m.</u>

The garments are to be counted, before the Fish and Chip Lunch, and will be on display, briefly, before being posted to the Loving Hands Foundation, in Fife; they will then be sent to Africa, where they will be distributed, according to need.

What has been particularly pleasing is that producing the vests has brought people together; individually, we have knitted our vests, but then we have come to church and discussed the size, shape, colour and design of our own and each other's garments. Those who haven't knitted have brought wool or donated money to buy wool. And, of course, as several people have said, the vests have been knitted with love. Well done!

**P.S.** The Fish and Chip Lunch, on April 18<sup>th</sup>, was very successful and will be well-worth repeating. Beryl had displayed the vests and beanies, in the upstairs room, where they looked magnificent, with their varied patterns and colours. Howard took lots of photographs to record the occasion and the achievement. By that date, we had collected 154 vests and 42 beanies (including 10 brought in, on the day, by a visitor, who had read about our effort, in "The Bury Times"). There are more vests in the pipeline, and everything will be sent off to Fife, in due course. Concern had been expressed that vests being sent to Africa did not always reach their destination; I have enquired about this and have been assured that problems do not arise.

It is highly likely that the knitting of the vests will be carried on, at another church; Sandra Butler (Jean Kenyon's daughter) heard about the idea and is hoping to persuade the ladies at her chapel to continue the effort.

The winner of the competition to guess how many vests we had knitted was Daisy, the grand-daughter of Susan Mitchell (neé Poulson), from Stand, who visited on Easter Sunday; the runnerup was June Clarke, who guessed 155 vests.
