WOMEN'S LEAGUE

The 2016/7 charity will be the National Deaf Children's Society; fundraiser Louisa Moorhouse spoke about its work at this year's GA Meetings. This year sees the 10th anniversary of compulsory monitoring for deafness at birth. 1 in 4 babies suffer temporary or permanent deafness, at this point, and there are currently 45,000 sufferers. 90% of deaf babies are born to hearing parents. This is a hidden disability, and a huge barrier to communication; deaf children are vulnerable and isolated and suffer from mental health and educational problems. Help is available, and used: a free Helpline for enquiries, a network of support-officers, aids to be borrowed, a Roadshow, Family Weekends, confidence-building events called "Me2", and campaigns such as "Close the Gap" (about educational opportunities) and "Listen Up!" (about audiology services in England). There are more than 32 million deaf children worldwide, and work is carried out in countries such as South Asia. Latin America and East Africa. Louisa then introduced Atia Ahmed, a NDCS volunteer, who has 3 children; the eldest is hearing, but the other 2 are deaf. Atia spoke movingly of her feelings on learning that her second son was deaf; she was in denial, at first---very upset and unable to process information; she felt very negative and emotional and found difficulty in telling her husband, family and friends. However, she learned, over time, that professional help and support are available; her second son is now a happy, confident 10-year-old, thanks to the NDCS.

The Women's League project for 2015/6 raised £6,000 for Unitarian College, Manchester.

EASTER: MARCH 27TH, 2016

Easter Sunday---always a tricky day for Unitarians---but not today! Rev. Beryl Allerton reminded us, first and foremost, about the tragedies of the past week in Brussels. She commented that innocent people are still being sacrificed, nowadays, for what is done in the name of faith, power and hatred. In a brilliant sermon, Beryl drew parallels between the current situation in Brussels and Jerusalem at the time of Jesus' entry there, his arrest and subsequent crucifixion. Jesus undermined hatred and lawlessness with love, and turned what looked like defeat into triumphant success. In Brussels, the desire for vengeance was replaced by a feeling of solidarity and a need to express ideas of forgiveness and shared sympathy. Evil must always be defeated, and this is the way in which to achieve our aim---violence must not prevail. A powerful message, which we should all remember!

MINISTER'S MONTH

I am at the stage of doing things for the last time before retirement. It has been that way since Christmas – this is the last time I will Yet it is hard to get out of the habit of accumulating things for this or that service, a reading or a prayer or opening words. Someone said to me recently that I must think sermons all the time. This is true, and true I suspect for every minister, whatever we encounter there is always an awareness that this might provide a sermon. Will this stop happening, I doubt it will, at least in the short term, and no doubt there will be times when I think, what a waste that would have been a cracking sermon.

At the moment John and I are trying to help others to do cracking sermons and prayers and readings. The numbers at the 'Taking the Service' sessions both surprised and delighted us. I think it is an indication

of the positive way in which everyone is approaching the time without a minister as one of challenge and opportunity. In May I will be doing two sessions on pastoral care out of which I hope a small group will take on responsibility for all aspects of pastoral care which is much more than just visiting the sick.

These last four week have been particularly sad and difficult. We have lost five members and former members of the congregation. I have never before conducted so many funerals for members in such a short space of time and I have found it to be emotionally exhausting. Of course beforehand I had spent a lot of time supporting and visiting those who were so ill and their families. I feel it has cast a shadow over my last few weeks as minister I never imagined we could lose so many people all at once.

My retirement will give me chance to spend more time at our caravan where the red squirrels seem to be well established judging by number this spring. And on 18th April as we were putting up the awning a duck with twelve tiny ducklings appeared. This is the earliest we can remember seeing ducklings. They are the most delightful sight, as they toddle and tumble along after mum. At the moment the environs of the caravan are covered in gold there being so many daffodils, it is really quite beautiful.

I am looking forward to the Cherry Blossom Service my final special service for which I hope we will have a lovely warm day. If this proves to be the case then we will have white wine in the garden before lunch and this will give us the opportunity the capture some photographic memories which I can keep. Thank you to everyone who has volunteered to help.
