THANKS!

When Betty Kenyon conducted our service for us, on March 25th, she took "One World" as her theme and spoke much to the point about the desirability of learning to live in our world in peace and harmony with one another, no matter whom we encounter within our sphere. She commented that it was vital for us to live without prejudice, according to the liberal, tolerant principles which encompass our Unitarian tradition. Betty's story concerned Guru Nanak, the founder of Sikhism, who believed that there should never be barriers of race, class, caste, creed or colour; those who endorsed his views were to be encouraged to travel throughout the world, spreading the word to all who would listen.

When we encounter others who are different from ourselves, in any way, we should endeavour to understand the person, as well as the difference, in the interests of world accord and empathy, and we must always be alert to the misuse of emotive language, especially in the media, which may lead us into poor judgement. Each of us is special; in our dealings with others, we should always be mindful that, if we denigrate them, we destroy an essential part of their humanity, instead of creating respect for our fellowmen. In a world in which many suffer from indignities of all kinds, our love and kindness for others is an aim which we should strive to maintain, at all times.

On April 8th, Val Chamberlain conducted our service, as an essential part of her Worship Studies Course. Her theme was "Gratitude". The hymns we sang reinforced this theme, especially the third one ("Think of a world without any animals....."). Val's story concerned an elderly lady, who, as her Life Savings, boxed up days from different stages of her childhood; eventually, in later life, she took them out, one at a time, recreated them, and enjoyed them all over again. These were not special occasions---just typical, ordinary, daily experiences, which removed her, temporarily, from the preoccupations of adult life, to which she returned, refreshed and renewed. The first reading advised parents to teach their children to learn to appreciate the finer qualities of life---not through material elements, or special, high-profile occasions, but by celebrating and rejoicing in everyday happenings, so that they became grateful for day-to-day experiences. The

second reading took us to the other end of the scale: in old age, we should have reached a point at which we are able to let go of non-essentials; we should not hanker after achievements, ambitions and excitements, but should concentrate, instead, on the genuine pleasure-enhancing elements of life, such as thoughtfulness, kindness, and enjoyment of music, food, friendship. Val's sermon united ideas from both readings and the story. If we can learn to distinguish between what is truly important and what can be discarded, we may come close to an appreciative, grateful approach to life. As part of a series of seminars she had undertaken, Val had kept a Diary of Gratitude, noting down a list of simple things which, day by day, had given her pleasure; she found that, the longer she kept her diary, the more she found to appreciate and enjoy in her life. For example, time spent with friends, relaxing, feeling comfortable with them, and at ease with oneself, can be both satisfying and fulfilling. Such situations help us to perceive what is important to us---what should be retained, and what should be rejected, which provides us with a valuable perspective on our lives.

Marian Price, in her service on April 22nd, concentrated on the power of memories. We all have personal memories of past times---some happy, to be cherished, and others, more painful, yet important to our experience of life in general, which we might prefer to forget. People, places and events trigger reminiscences, and the quality of our remembrance can be assisted by photographs, newspaper-clippings, perfumes or music, often recalling those who are dear to us, but who may not be with us, either temporarily or permanently. However, we should not necessarily dwell in the past, in the "good old days", but must remember that all past experience shapes our present, and our future. Positive memories suffuse our present and future with happiness, helping us to lead contented, fulfilled lives; negative memories may carry with them a reminder that we should learn not to make the same mistakes again, or give us strength to cope with upsetting situations which may recur. The Fox, in the children's story, learned the value, literally, of the saying : "A bird in the hand is worth two in the bush"; the poem about past experiences celebrated a lifetime of happy memories; and all the hymns urged us to appreciate the quality of life, and its influence, that we have, at all times.

The above three services, each excellent in content, yet different in theme, serve as a reminder of how fortunate we are to be able to call upon such skilled service-leaders, who present us, willingly, with high-quality worship. Thank you, all of you, for contributing so positively to our church-life. *Anne*

GENERAL DATA PROTECTION REGISTRATION

Changes in legislation mean that we have been obliged to review our data protection procedures; more information will be made available, in the weeks and months to come. The first step is to issue our Data Protection Policy---in our calendar, on our notice-board, and on our website. Over time, this may have to be modified, but a start has now been made.

"Under the terms of the General Data Protection Registration (2018), Bury Unitarian Church will use information provided by its members for its own social and administrative purposes <u>only</u>. A member's personal information will be removed from the church-records within one month of the receipt of a written request, to that effect. Bury Unitarian Church will not pass on members' details to any thirdparties outside the church, without permission; information held by the Minister or Church Officers of a confidential nature will not be passed on to other church-members; this will include Gift Aid details. If photographs are taken on church-premises of church-members, Bury Unitarian Church will assume that, unless instructed otherwise, permission for these to be displayed is granted. In the case of members of the Junior Church, the permission of the children's parents will always be gained before photographs of them are taken or used (for example, in the church-calendar, or on the churchwebsite); in such cases, surnames and ages will never be included."

MINISTER'S MESSAGE

Dear all,

I no longer feel able to keep predicting the better weather coming, but today, at least, is lovely, so we'll go with that!

Firstly, thank you for all your birthday wishes, and the cards and gifts. Special thanks to June Clarke for the lovely cake. I had a delicious (drawn out) birthday, and now, at fifty, I think you can all agree I'm generally lofty and mature.

Myself and four of the congregation (Betty Kenyon, Neville Kenyon, Susan Holt and Val Chamberlain) are all just home from the General Assembly Annual Meetings. It's always refreshing, and exhausting, to spend time with so many other Unitarians, and I was very proud to be there with the Bury contingent (not that we got to spend much time together). You can be very proud of your delegates, who bore in mind the decisions made at the congregational meeting and then stood their ground, in one case in face of, I'm afraid, some bad behaviour from other people in the meetings.

If you're shopping specially for the Foodbank, some of the most useful items are, apparently, tinned hotdogs, tinned meatballs, and tinned potatoes, as well as pasta and pasta sauces. Toiletries are also always welcome.

As you all know, the church holds a coffee morning every Saturday, and this is a rich and valuable piece of the church's work. If you don't come to the coffee morning, or haven't been for a while, you are very welcome to pop in. The welcome is good, and the cakes are generally delicious. There's even bacon sandwiches sometimes. I'm always very aware that as well as those of us who come regularly (or less regularly) to services, there is a secondary community of people to whom the church is important and who are also part of our family. There are several spouses and partners of members who are involved in our activities, there are the coffee morning regulars, and there are people who come to our social and other activities. I'm very proud that we're also a home for so many people who don't attend our main services.

Ballot papers will be available in the vestibule for a month after the service and discussion, and the wording of the vote will be:

"I agree that Bury Unitarian Church should apply for authorisation to conduct marriages for same-sex couples on an equal basis with those between a man and a woman."
