minute's silence, in memory of Pat, was observed before the service, on March 26th, and at the start of the Church Council Meeting, on March 29th.

MOTHERING SUNDAY

Because of Kate's absence, the Mothering Sunday service, on March 26th, was delivered by Anne Mills; the words were mainly Kate's, to which Anne added various extras, including the children's story; posies of daffodils were distributed to everyone present, whilst an arrangement of "Memories", performed by three of Derek Worthington's grandchildren and first heard at his funeral, was played; fruit cake---a last-minute substitute for Simnel---was served with the coffee, afterwards. Kate's sermon dwelled on the conflicting feelings experienced on Mothering Sunday; this day is not necessarily one of unalloyed happiness; for all sorts of reasons, it can provoke sadness and pain, which must be managed. Kate also drew parallels between the actual family and the church family; many of the situations which arise and the emotions experienced are similar, whether positive or negative. Many thanks to Anne for stepping into the breach at such short notice and for conducting the service so ably.

MINISTER'S MESSAGE

Firstly, and I always seem to be starting these with thanks to the congregation, I want to thank you all for the concern and compassion (shall we call it love?) that you've shown to me and Adrian following my mother's death in March, and for your understanding about the disruption it's caused to my work with you.

We will have finished clearing out her house by the end of the month at the latest, and I won't have to be trailing up and down the country any more, and I do promise that at that point I will be back to being in Bury full time and providing you with what you deserve in the way of presence and pastoral care.

I am very glad that my mum got to know some of you in the last few months - she commented several times on how lovely you all are and what a good ministry I'd found. I have to agree!

April did have a couple of highlights, in between the travelling and the house clearing: it was a real treat to see so many Bury people at the General Assembly in Birmingham. I only made it for two days, by which time everyone looked much more tired than me, but it's great that more and more people are getting to know what goes on in the denomination and in the

wider world. Quite a few of my friends made comments like "oh, I was talking to one of your congregation in the lift - aren't you lucky there?". Yup, I am. I know that some of the people who attended the meetings will be doing a service to talk about their experiences, and hopefully other people might be encouraged to join in.

I also loved sharing Easter with the congregation, and I was particularly pleased to finally get round to holding a communion service. Nine of us attended on Good Friday, and shared bread and grape juice. I can't think of anything more sacred than sharing food and drink together, and the occasion managed to be holy, significant, and - just as importantly - convivial and chatty afterwards.

Following that success, I'm going to start holding monthly communion services in the church, on the first Sunday of the month - so the first one will be on Sunday 7th May. They'll take place after the main service and after coffee, so those who wish to take part can join in with the coffee and fellowship and then make their way into the sanctuary for 1245.

Unitarian communion isn't like other communion services: it is open to everyone, regardless of whether you've been baptised, or confirmed, or whatever your religious beliefs are. It is a symbolic and sacred

sharing of food, drink, and company. If you're reluctant to join in, you're very welcome to come along and see what we're doing. The services will take a variety of forms, but will all have the sharing of physical and spiritual food together at their core.

Plans are still underway to have an open house at the Manse at some point soon - obviously recent events have got in the way. But you're always welcome to call and invite yourself round for a cuppa. And, of course, I'm generally in the vestry one day a week (almost always Friday). This might increase once the vestry is rearranged and once I've set up a small computer in there. And once things are calmer I'm going to go back to spending a morning in the tea rooms at the museum - probably a Wednesday (because it's market day and people are in town). But watch this space - and just at the moment it's probably wise to give me a quick call before heading out to see me!

Spring can't seem to make up its mind whether it's here or not - yesterday we drove over the Cat and Fiddle in snow, and today is bright and fresh, so I don't know where it's going yet! But I'm loving watching the slightly different way seasons happen up here in the North West.
