CHARITY COMMITTEE

Our cheque to Bleakholt Animal Sanctuary was handed over to Vicki Appleton, the Chairman of their Trustees, by the Deputy Mayor, Councillor Sharon Briggs, at our Harvest Festival, on October 5th; also present were Deputy Mayoress, Shirley Rabbett, and Muriel Bird, a founder member of Bleakholt. The total raised was £1,180.70, with Bleakholt goods amounting to over £60 also being sold.

A substantial amount of used textiles was collected and sent to Bleakholt, from the church, for which they were extremely grateful.

On the afternoon of October 5th, a party of 8 enjoyed a visit to Bleakholt; they were guided around by Muriel, who was particularly anxious to show them the newly-acquired donkeys. A good time was had by all!

BURY LIGHT NIGHT

Our second contribution to Bury Light Night took place on October 10th; we were assured that our gardens were, again, the best in the whole area, although we didn't think that they were as good as last year's, when the gardens were ablaze with lights of all colours. The most impressive decorations, this year, were the large, white carrier-bags that children wrote messages on; these then had an illuminated candle added to their interiors, and all of them were placed in a semi-circle, near the fountain, which had, itself, been transformed into a dome of light.

As far as we were concerned, we had more people through our doors than last year; many had returned specially, having visited last year, and they spent time looking round the worship-area, inspecting Betty's display, and examining our selection of leaflets and calendars. We served plate after plate of hotpot and black

peas, and drinks of all kinds were in great demand. Unfortunately, on account of extremely dense traffic, Chris Price was unable to reach us, so those who had come to listen to him play were disappointed.

Despite this setback, all our visitors enjoyed themselves, and the occasion was worthwhile. Thanks to all who helped on the evening. (Council expressed its thanks to Anne for the hotpot, and to Susan for the black peas.)

NOTES FROM CHURCH COUNCIL MEETING: 13-10-14.

A minute's silence was observed, in memory of Miriam Murphy.

The Art Exhibition was very successful, and much appreciation was shown. The Harvest Festival was excellent, with beautiful floral displays and a wonderful atmosphere. Lunch at Park Farm provided an extremely pleasant occasion, and thanks were expressed to Anne for her very efficient organisation and for providing the sherry.

Finance: PAT Testing is to be arranged; the upstairs kitchen is to be decorated soon, and the new splashback fitted; a general advertising budget of £2,000 per annum was agreed; it is hoped that we can fit a donation-box into one of the church-walls; this will be kept locked, at all times; members of the congregation are requested to leave all monies in this, for the sake of security; changes in the rules for reclaiming Gift Aid have created complications, but the amount reclaimed continues to be very pleasing; a Panic Button is to be fitted in the Primary, in case of emergencies; the leader can then summon assistance from people in the worship-area.

The Treasurer reported a healthy balance, after 8 months, and looked forward to a year-end surplus; he also hoped for a financially-successful Bazaar.

Lettings Secretary: We have been approached about a 10-week let, for two and a half hours, on Monday afternoons, to begin after Christmas; it was felt that we might manage to steward this.

Social and Fund Raising: The next event to be organised will be the Christmas Concert, on December 6th.

Communications and Worship, with Young People:

A retiring collection, in aid of The Royal British Legion, will be taken on Remembrance Sunday; the Unitarian Renewal Group Day Gathering was a pleasant occasion, despite a low turnout; 3 Junior Church members and their leader greatly enjoyed a recent weekend at Hucklow; thanks were expressed to June for her contribution.

The Minister reported that we need more Junior Church leaders and helpers; on December 21st, there will not be a morning service; instead, in the evening, a communion service will be followed by a Candlelit Carol Service; the seminars on Growth generated some workable ideas, which we hope to put into practice in due course; the First World War research continues, but progress is slow, and the work is time-consuming; all the information collected will eventually be included in a book.

Charity: The final amount raised for Bleakholt was more than £1,200; a letter of thanks and a certificate had been received; information is to be sought about supporting sufferers of prostate cancer, with a view to setting up a group as next year's charity.

NELUM:The next meeting will be held on 10-11-14, at 7 p.m; at Padiham; an instruction-course on Facebook and other social media has been suggested, and interest will be explored.

Correspondence: several letters of thanks had been received; all have been placed on the notice-board.

Any Other Business: The Art Society has donated a painting of the church; it was decided that this would be auctioned off during the Bazaar; a silent auction will be held. The plants in the outside tubs are to be renewed. It was agreed that we would approach the local authority to ask whether the Library Gardens could be renamed to reflect our ownership more accurately.

The date of the next meeting is Wednesday, December 10th, at 7 p.m.

There is a marked increase in rabbits on the site which means all my plants will be eaten and if not by the rabbits then by the deer which come onto the site when the people leave.

The Light Night was once again a great success with lots of people coming into the church, more than last year. This year we were better prepared, we had displays up and leaflets out as well as buckets of black peas and pans of hot-pot at the ready. We were busy all evening and there was a really good atmosphere. It is not easy to explain the finer points of Unitarianism while serving black peas though we did our best. I thought at the end of the evening how many people who had not even known the church existed before went away with a really good impression of it. Thank you to all who helped, making and serving and talking and laughing for and with all our visitors. (My job had been to source black peas for this event)

The Harvest Service brought a welcome return of Councillor Sharon Briggs, now Deputy Mayor, to present the cheque on our behalf to Bleakholt Animal Sanctuary, our charity for the year. Later that day some of us visited Bleakholt for a guided tour. I have to say I was very impressed at the improvements that have been made over the years, everything was very clean and the animals all well cared for. I have homed two dogs from the sanctuary in the past both wonderful and much loved. In year gone by there were always a great variety of dogs of all shapes, sizes and colours. Not so now, almost all are Staffordshire Bull Terriers or crosses of the same. These are the dogs favoured as accessories by young men who quickly tire of the commitment and discard them. The lucky dogs find themselves at somewhere like Bleakholt where there is good care and the possibility of a new loving home, others are less fortunate. What a sad reflection on our throw- away society when even sentient creatures are disposable.

The Pie and Peas Supper and Quiz for the Women's League project was a great success, so many tickets were sold that the upstairs hall had to be used. The evening caused brains to ache over nursery rhymes and children's songs with only initials to give a clue to their titles. It was good to welcome friends from Rochdale and Stand. (I was on mushy peas duty)

I have just realised that this Minister's Month is all about food – very Unitarian. And finally the lunch at Park Farm, the last of our fortieth celebrations, this was absolutely excellent and the fitting end to the year. Thank you to Anne for organising this. GROWTH SEMINARS

The first growth seminar was a bit hap-hazard as I think we did not really know where to begin on such a big undertaking and were somewhat overwhelmed. I had not structured the evening in any way as I wanted people to be free to express ideas, in the event I think that the evening left people confused. By comparison the second seminar was far more focused and applied some rigorous discussion to how the church makes itself open and visible because we felt we had good things to offer.

I have listed below some of the ideas – please talk about them and if you want more information I will try to help.

'Buddies' about 5/6 people who are willing to speak to visitors and welcome them. It was thought that if we have people who are willing to make themselves responsible for this then everyone is not waiting for everyone else to do it. Please volunteer after all it is only an occasional task. See Sue Mitchell who is collecting names.

Interest Group it was suggested that an interest group for members open to others would be a way of encouraging people into the church, meeting people and getting to know them and maybe wanting to come to services.

Special Services Services with a theme that would be of general interest so that we can invite people to come along.

Opening the church Events such as the Art Exhibition and Light Night where the church is open for people to just come in and look around.

Moving the Front Door It was unanimously agreed that moving the door to the side overlooking the gardens would be a good thing.

Different Services A parallel church which offered a different type of worship.

Video publicity a screen to run videos of church services and events when the church is open so that people see us in action.

Facebook The church is already on Facebook and this was agreed to be a good thing. There was some discussion about how this is handled in the future. The idea of a ministerial blog was also discussed.

Car Park the difficulty of daytime parking and thus daytime events was addressed and it was felt that maybe we should keep more spaces for ourselves.

The key question was why do we want to grow?

It was decided to have a follow up meeting in six months to see how we are doing.

NOTES FROM 1974 (11)

November 1974 was dominated by the church's annual Autumn Fair and by Remembrance Sunday---as might be said today, too! The Autumn Fair, held on the 2nd, was organised by the Efforts Committee; it began at 2.45 p.m; was chaired by Colonel R.M. Barlow and opened by Michael Fidler. (I was, at first, puzzled by the lack of the initials "M.P." after Mr. Fidler's name; however, recourse to Wikipedia informed me that the Member of Parliament for Bury and Radcliffe lost his seat at the elections held on October 10th, that year, so the editor of the calendar was certainly on the ball!) My own recollections of Autumn Fairs, around that period, were that the opening ceremonies were very formal occasions, and the Chairman and Opener were always presented with a buttonhole carnation by one of the children.

The young people of the church were well-represented, that month; church-parade was held on Remembrance Sunday, November 10th; the Youth Club and UYPL organised a joint Disco, on Saturday, the 9th, and Junior Church flowers were contributed by Kathryn and Sally Jackson, on the 17th, and by Carolyn and Melanie Pollitt, on the 24th. On Remembrance Sunday, Colonel Barlow laid the wreath on the steps of the War Memorial, and he was escorted by Mrs. Irene Sutherland (my mother) and Mr. Frank Carter (the

church-organist). It is possible that, in our 40^{th} year, we may return to the practice of escorting the wreath-layer.

Both The Women's League and The Men's Fellowship held intriguing meetings; the ladies were entertained by Mr. Jack Crabtree and "Over My Shoulder" and, later in the month, visited the gas showrooms for a demonstration entitled "Cooking with Cider"; the men heard a talk by Derek Janes, M.A; the Keeper of Social History in Bury, whilst their second meeting explored "The Bury Dig". If anyone can shed light on the content of these meetings, please let me know. A Cheese and Wine Evening, on the 22nd, promised that the film about the building of the new church would be shown.

In the Stop Press section of the calendar, the North-East Lancashire Lay-Preachers' Association pleaded for greater numbers of lay-preachers to come forward; anyone interested was asked to contact Rev. John Roberts urgently. In his Minister's Month, John Allerton makes reference to low numbers training for the Ministry---a fact which became obvious at the Opening Session at Unitarian College Manchester. It was not all doom and gloom from UCM, however, as John records that the management and facilities at the college were much improved; he did wonder, though, what had happened to all the "ancient, cracked and curling linoleum". Another old building visited by John, at this period, was the Unitarian Church, in Wakefield, where he attended the induction of Rev. Ernest Baker; the church is an excellent example of mid-18th Century church-architecture and contains beautiful stained-glass windows and fine woodwork. The church is not the easiest place to find, as it is hidden in a maze of one-way streets, and extra security precautions because of the trial of the M62 coach-bombers added further difficulty to the journey. (Wikipedia---again---states that the bombing occurred shortly after midnight, on February 4th, 1974, between Junctions 26 and 27, near Oakwell Hall;12 people were killed, and 38 injured, by a bomb attributed to the Provisional IRA.)

In addition to Wakefield, John visited Sheffield, to attend the annual committee meeting of the Send A Child To Hucklow Fund; at the time, the fund's turnover was approximately £3,000 per annum, which provided holidays for more than 170 children. It was remarkable that all the necessary business was transacted in a single two-hour meeting; John was able to report that the year's target had been exceeded and that an additional holiday for children from Bolton was envisaged, the following year. Excellent news! *Anne Mills*
