Anne went on to say how kindness can be shown in so many different ways, large or small. She reminded us how God can come to us in little ways and 'like a rainbow at the end of a storm' when we are most in need. A very meaningful service and very thought-provoking. Well done, Anne.

## **100 CLUB**

The 100 club was first started by Derek Worthington and has been running for a number of years.

The actual outlay in prize money is £400 per year which when it was started was half of the total amount raised. The remainder was passed onto the church to go towards its funds.

Over the last year the number of people taking up numbers for the draw has sadly diminished to a point where we are not covering £400 for the Church whilst the prize money remains the same. To keep the prize money at this rate we need more people to take up some more numbers. We are currently £152 short of our £800 total. (13 numbers)

WE have a number of alternatives.

One is to reduce the amount of prize money paid out each month to be £20 with extra payments of £20 in July and an extra payment of £50 in December.

Taking the total prize payments to £310.

The other alternative would be to increase the cost of each number to £15 which would take the amount raised above the £800.

This is the quandary I am in, and I shall be handing out a questionnaire in the near future as to what would be acceptable to you all.

## MINISTER'S MESSAGE

I can't quite believe I'm writing the calendar article for November – I've barely got used to the fact that the summer is over!

But November it is, and that means I've been living in Bury for a year now – we moved in to the manse on the 31<sup>st</sup> October, and I started work on the 1<sup>st</sup> November.

It's been quite a year – settling into a new home in a new town is always going to have its challenges, and I did wonder at first whether I'd just miss my home in Norwich. I do – but what I always notice, and point out – is that although I miss things in Norwich, I've never been homesick for it. I genuinely do now think of Bury as my home. A few weeks ago at a ministerial gathering someone said something slightly sneery about Bury (nothing awful, just a jokey comment- he was from Yorkshire! ) and I was instantly defensive and proud. It's like that thing where you can criticise your own family – I do perhaps moan about the road systems sometimes – but if anyone else does they're in trouble!

There are some things that have surprised me over the last year. I'm used to the North West, coming from Liverpool stock and having family still on the Wirral, but there are still some things that always strike me: I love that people here dress up for church on a Sunday. That's quite rare, and I think it's a good thing. And I love that beetroot is routinely served as an accompaniment – I love beetroot so any opportunity is good! I already liked black pudding, but I doubt I'll ever be fully converted to black peas. Sorry!

We have an exciting month ahead, as always. We're preparing for Christmas events already, and I know the raffle is already underway. But before that we have the Fusiliers concert on the 25<sup>th</sup> November, which I know will be a big attraction, and which I'm definitely looking forward to.

We're also looking forward to a visit from the President of the General Assembly, the Rev Charles Van Den Broeder, on Sunday 26<sup>th</sup>. I know we'll have a good turnout and make him welcome.

If you were at the Harvest Festival you'll know that we're starting a Food Bank collection, and the main day for offerings will be the first Sunday in every month. But items are welcome at any time, and there's a box in the hall for contributions. I've also spoken recently about the fact that the basic duty we have as humans, and as religious people, is to feed the hungry, help the poor, and befriend the

stranger. We're very, very, good at the last bit. I've always been awed by the welcome we offer people here, including those who may be more challenging. And as I mentioned in a service last month, there is now a small collection of carrier bags in the vestry containing long-life food which needs no preparation. If someone visits us and is hungry, please give them a bag of food. If someone is sleeping in our doorway and you've arrived for a meeting, please give them a bag of food and put the kettle on!

Obviously, if you are alone and not sure that the person is safe, wait for someone else to join you in making the tea and giving the food. If you think the person is unwell, you should phone the emergency services. But otherwise, treat them like you'd want to think a family member of your own would be treated if they were in that horrible situation.

By next month we'll be into the whirl of Christmas again, so watch this space for details of what we're up to!
