# **LUNCH AT PARK FARM**

#### **BURY LIGHT NIGHT**

This takes place on Friday, October 10, from 6 to 9 pm. Last year, we had about a hundred visitors through our doors, all of whom were impressed by our building and the activities inside it.

This year's theme is "Eastern Nights", and our gardens will be designed simply, to create a family-friendly space. There will be a Lantern House, where children can watch shadow-shows and make their own shadows, and a Dome, for storytelling and theatre events. Icicle-lights in the trees and playing around the fountain will enhance the magical atmosphere.

Once again, we intend to serve refreshments, including hotpot and black peas, and the Traidcraft and Book stalls will be open. Chris Price will be providing music, on the grand piano, during the evening, too. Please come along and support Bury Light Night and help us to welcome all our visitors to our premises. Last year was by way of an experiment, but a successful one, on which we hope to build, this time.

#### MINISTER'S MONTH

In the middle of September I received a Christmas present, not an early one but a delayed one. It was a trip to see War Horse at the Lowry Theatre. I have to say that, although I was looking forward to it, there was also some apprehension mixed into the anticipation as I thought it would be very sad in places. I obviously was not the only person feeling this way as, looking across the audience, it was clear that people had their hankies at the ready. I had heard a lot about the play and how wonderful it was, in fact more than wonderful. I have never seen or heard an audience as quiet or attentive during a whole production. The play showed the war we have been hearing so much about from a very different perspective, from the suffering of not just people but the horses they depended on. Huge numbers were shipped to France and thousands perished. The play though was different in that it was even handed about the two sides there, good and bad among both the British and Germans; it highlighted not difference but similarity. This is something I shall remember when we gather in November. Although the play is sad it has a happy ending when Joey (the farm horse and hero) comes home at the end of the war. This never happened, no horses came home any

surviving were shot, a fact I find hard to contemplate.

The Bury Art Society exhibition weekend was a success. Though it would have been nice to have more people visiting it was nevertheless very enjoyable. Thank you to all those who put their names down on the refreshments rota and helped to keep the coffee flowing for two whole days. The venue was offered free of charge to the artists, the intention was for the church to be

accessible rather than to make money. In fact it was a financial success too. Generous donations from the Art Society and receipts from refreshments gave us a good income. It may well be that this could be the beginning of a new association.

At the beginning of October two seminars on growth will be held in the lounge. Please come even if you think you have nothing to offer, you have, because everyone's opinion and support is vital if we decide that we are going to try and grow. There will be no huge plans, balloons or brass bands but hopefully some sensible, inspirational ideas that can be put into place within our church life to encourage others to come and share our community. I don't think we are ignorant of the reality that we are not going to have a long queue, but that does not mean we should not try to grow numerically, yes, but in

every way as a religious community. Please come along, I remember the seminars at the beginning of my time at Bury, the room was packed and there was a real enthusiasm about Bury Unitarian Church, I hope we have not lost that.

Autumn is upon us, the church is getting busier after its summer snooze. Harvest Services, Bazaar Meetings and collection of goods and then the event itself, Bury Light Night, Remembrance Services, Anniversary Lunch — the last of our 40<sup>th</sup> celebrations, a wedding and then into Christmas, I hope we will all have a good harvest of the church from this season of mists and mellow fruitfulness.

# **NOTES FROM 1974 (10)**

The start of the month was dominated by the Harvest, which took place on October 6, in 1974; the service was conducted by the Reverend David Doel, from Hindley, and Harvest-gifts were received by John and Jessie Lord, the parents of Betty Mason (now Walsh). There was the usual high standard of decoration in church, and the Church Council expressed its appreciation of the display of goods. It was stated that there had not been the difficulty encountered in previous years of disposing of Harvest-gifts, and the Guides were commended on their idea of presenting one composite gift; Mrs. Beckwith (whatever happened to her?) stated that this had subsequently

been presented to South View Hostel; it was recommended that this practice be adopted the following year.

The end of the month was busy, too; on the 26, the church played host to the Unitarian Musical Society, on the occasion of the Organists' Conference, and, in the evening, church-members made their way to the Town Hall, in Todmorden, for the NELUM Annual Dinner. Between the two periods, there was much whist, whilst the Women's League and The Men's Fellowship heard talks on "Holiday Memories" and "Prisons", respectively.

Various church-committees were keeping busy; the Worship Questionnaire and the Stewards' List were under consideration by the Public Relations Committee, who also organised a Lending Scheme of books from the entrance showcase. The Choir and Worship Committee recommended that money raised during the Christmas collections should be donated to Send A Child To Hucklow. Other bodies made decisions about the lounge curtains, which were

duly ordered, and a new notice decreed that confetti was not to be thrown near the church-door.

At the October Council meeting, there was discussion about the church-heating, which was still not performing satisfactorily, and about other uncompleted work on the building; all matters were still under discussion with the architects. Records were being kept of the temperature and time of the heating-settings, in order to assist in future planning and budgeting; it was decreed that heating in the schoolrooms would be switched on at 6 p.m. and off at 9.30 p.m. on weeknights, and the illuminated strip on the church tower would be lit "from the commencement of darkness to 10 p.m. daily". The lights in the lounge were to be switched off whilst the Sunday service was in progress. Economy was the order of the day!

Planning was in hand for the Autumn Fair, as well as for Christmas activities---but more about all this next time. *Anne Mills*
