MINISTER'S MONTH

After what has been one of the wettest summers on record it was a worry that the trip to the National Memorial Arboretum in Staffordshire would be ruined by the weather. Instead summer happened just in time and the day was warm, in fact very warm and sunny. This was perfect weather because the site is large and open and this meant there was a gentle, cooling breeze that made strolling and sitting comfortable. There are now over two hundred memorials on the site and each time I go, new ones have been constructed. Many are impressive, some are heart-rending, I always find myself in tears at some time during a visit. On this visit I was moved by two things, firstly the memorial to those 'shot at dawn'. Three hundred and six British soldiers killed by firing squad for cowardice. It would emerge later that many were accused erroneously and should not have died. The second thing was a bunch of lilies freshly laid on the reconstruction of the Sumatra railway. The arboretum is not just made up of military memorials many other groups have spaces there. Among these is one for the stillbirth and neonatal baby deaths. In the past parents often did not get the chance to see stillborn babies let alone hold funeral services and so had nowhere to go to remember their child. I am sure this memorial has given parents a place to remember and has brought comfort to them. Over 300.000 people visit the arboretum each year and it costs over a million pounds each year to maintain it. Yet there is no admission charge all costs are met by personal and corporate donations. The site was originally part of a large gravel pit and was gifted by the owners Lafarge for the purpose of creating the memorial.

As autumn looms committees are gearing up for forthcoming events. Meetings for the Bazaar have already been held and details agreed. There are people who have offered to run stalls but extra volunteers are always welcome. Arrangements for the concert by Tony Berry at the Harvest Weekend are almost complete. And those taking part in the Christmas concert are booked. All these things happen because willing volunteers give their time, without this gift the church would be much poorer both in friendship and financially.

Unfortunately we have not been so fortunate in the administration of the church. We are still without a Church Secretary despite a number of appeals. Our very grateful thanks goes to Anne Evitts who has acted as the Secretary for the last three meetings. The workload has been reduced by others taking on various tasks that used to be done by the Secretary and it was hoped that this would lead to someone feeling they could volunteer. The Secretary plays an important part in the smooth running of the church and is an essential position, please help if you can.

I am taking the first week in September as my week off during which I am going, with a friend, to Dublin. I am hoping to go to service at Stephen's Green where Rev Bill Darlison had such a successful Ministry. Their congregation is well in excess of a hundred each week and I will be looking for tips and inspiration.

NOTES FROM AUGUST CHURCH COUNCIL MEETING: 13-08-12

The minutes of the June meeting were amended to include the decision to hold a Bazaar, again, this year. An open meeting to discuss preliminary matters was held on 23-07-12; a copy of the meeting-notes is on the notice-board

.Nominations are sought for the post of G.A. Vice-President for 2013-14; this will be a lay-person.

It was agreed to donate two panes of glass to the Frenchay Chapel, Bristol, who had requested help with their repair-work.

Finance: Permission has been given, by the local authority, for us to relocate the outside notice-board; this is work in progress. Risk Analysis work is also ongoing; PJ Fire Risk Assessments Limited have submitted a comprehensive document to help us, and this needs to be read and actioned.

GO Organs have assessed the church-organ; written documentation is awaited.

A grant from The Millenium Fund, for an additional loop system, has been requested.

The Treasurer reported that we are on target, so far; income from Yoga is lower, but higher from the Music Exams. We may have to pay for jobs which arise as a result of Risk Analysis work. The budget forecast he has prepared is valuable, as it gives a clear picture of the situation.

Efforts: The Barbecue was very successful and enjoyable, despite the hard work involved. Publicity-materials for the Tony Berry Concert have been collected. The Christmas Concert will take place on December 1.

Communications and Worship, with Young People: Roger would welcome help with administering the church-website; Facebook and Twitter feeds should be considered. The Mayor and her consort will attend for the Harvest Service and on the first Sunday in December. Thanks were expressed to John Allerton for conducting the service <u>and</u> playing the piano, on August 5. Commemorative tree-planting by the members of the Junior Church, and a picnic at Holebottom, are planned for September 16, after the service.

<u>The Minister</u> reported a quieter period since the Jubilee Weekend. She commented on the tremendous amount of work involved in booking musicians for services, in which both she and Anne have been, and continue to be, concerned. Beryl intends to organise a series of seminars in the autumn, on the theme of Journeying; a service focussing on the purple hymnbook is also planned.

<u>Charity</u>: The next event will be a Murder Mystery Evening, with Cheese and Wine, on September 1; arrangements are in hand.

<u>The Membership Secretary</u> gave her report, and discussion followed; it was felt that a Membership Book, rather than forms, would be useful; the process of membership needs to be less formal and more gradual. An up-to-date address-list for the members of the congregation would be desirable. <u>The Chairman</u> expressed her thanks to Anne Evitts for acting as Minutes' Secretary for the last 3 Council Meetings; volunteers are sought for the next 3.

The lounge is in need of re-decorating, and this will be put in hand; the question of either cleaning or decorating the worship-area was also considered.

<u>The next meeting</u> will be held on Monday, October 8 at 7 pm.

WARNING

We are all aware that we should never give bank details to anyone who contacts you by phone. Please be aware that there is a very clever scam being carried out -

On being contacted by the Fraud Department of your Bank, telling you that an attempt is being made to withdraw money from your account, you would obviously be concerned but would still not give out any of your bank details. Knowing this, the Fraud Department will ask you to ring them back on the number you will find on the reverse of your credit/debit card. **DON'T DO IT!!!**

The 'Fraud Department' do not disconnect the call and when you dial through to your bank you think you are speaking to a genuine bank official, but you are actually still speaking to real fraudsters! Having been supposedly validated, and having gained your confidence, you can imagine the possibilities. If you can, ring your bank on a different land line or on a mobile phone.

(This has happened to one of your congregation and it was a traumatic, and costly, experience.)
