An article and photographs of our Reunion Service appeared in the August issue of "The Inquirer".

The lounge will be decorated between October 7th and 9th.

The visit from Unity chapel-members was very successful, and a repeat is planned.

Finance

All work on the new church notice-board has now been completed and paid for from a bequest from the late Irene Rogers.

A Fire Prevention Course is to be arranged; this will include information about fire-extinguisher operations.

Performance Lighting will be hired for the Harvest Weekend.

Live giving needs a boost if it is to keep pace with regular running-costs. Stewarding is still proving problematic; we may need to give out keys to regular hirers or to consider appointing a caretaker; this will be further discussed by this committee.

Gift Aid contributions are slightly down but generally doing well.

The floor of the upstairs hall may need to be sanded and polished; quotations will be sought.

Further discussion about the cleaning of the premises is required before the October Council Meeting.

The Treasurer reported the half-yearly figures; we are on track, although we may suffer a slight loss at the year-end.

We now have a new electricity and gas contract with Scottish Power.

The Efforts Committee met to discuss the Brass Band Concert, on October 5th; HD Brass and the Notability Choir will give a concert on the first Saturday in December.

Communications and Worship with Young People

The G.A. President, Rev. Bill Darlison, will conduct our service on December 8th.

Members of the Rochdale congregation will join us for worship, on November 24th.

Ideas for the Memorial Garden at Holebottom have been revised, and a simpler, cheaper plan has been agreed.

Two members of the Junior Church, plus a leader, are to attend a Junior Weekend at Hucklow.

It is hoped to arrange Safeguarding Training for Adults soon.

The Minister reported that extra help with the Junior Church is still required.

She proposed the setting-up of interest-groups, perhaps with tastersessions for a few different ones, to begin in October.

She hopes to arrange a Retreat, next spring, at Rydal Hall, Ambleside. We need to give thought to attracting new members to the church.

The Charity Committee will present the money raised for NWAA at the Harvest Festival. Suggestions for next year are to be sought.

Arrangements for the Bazaar are in hand; a copy of the minutes of the meeting held on 22-07-13 is on the notice-board.

The next meeting will be held on 14 October at 7 pm.

MINISTER'S MONTH

It is a measure of the inquiring and accepting spirit within the Bury congregation that changing the format of Sunday worship, quite radically

and with little warning, does not cause problems. The recent service, on the theme of bullying, when members of the congregation were invited to come forward and speak without forward planning was one of these occasions. No one grumbled about the change, rather the opposite, there was much positive comment about the opening up of the service and the contribution from those who spoke. Thank you to those who came forward and shared their thoughts and experiences. I know that having a number of people do this emphasised how widespread and diverse the problem of bullying is. A follow-up discussion evening has been requested and I will try to organise this in the next few weeks.

There are some people who just make you smile and, for me, one of these is Reverend Jim McClelland. He is one of the most smiley people I know and always greets you with a loud and friendly 'Well, Hello there'. Even when I speak to him on the telephone, as I did a few days ago, I find myself smiling as I image him beaming at me down the phone. What a lovely quality to have. He sends best wishes to us all.

I recently read about the life of country parsons in the 19th century and thought how different it was from my life. It appears that a country parson could expect to earn £500 per year, the equivalent today of at least two hundred thousand pounds. Jane Austen, who complained about the poverty she suffered as a parson's daughter, grew up in a house with seven bedrooms and servants! The book says that being a parson provided a very good living with little required in return. The role of the clergy was a loose one, piety was not a requirement or even an expectation. Most ministers studied classics not theology. They had no training in how to preach, provide inspiration or comfort or otherwise offer meaningful ministry. Many didn't bother composing sermons but just bought books of prepared sermons and read one out each week. One vicar in Yorkshire had such poor attendance at his services that he converted half his church into a henhouse. One Reverend Hawker of Cornwall wore a pink fez, which makes my shoes look very tame. In March 1851 there was a survey to see how many people actually attended church. We tend to think that, at this time, everyone went to church but we would be wrong, the survey revealed that less than half the population did so.

I don't think the hens would be a good idea but I might consider a pink fez. **Beryl**
