

Cancellations: a message from Anne Mills, church secretary:

With effect from March 17th, ALL ACTIVITIES at church, including services, have been cancelled, on account of the Coronavirus pandemic. The AA will continue to meet, if they choose to do so, independently. The situation will be reviewed at the end of March.

The Congregational AGM, scheduled for April 5th, is postponed indefinitely, and new arrangements will be made once this is possible; the church-officers have agreed to continue in post until then.

The Church Council Meeting, on April 15th, will probably be rescheduled; you will be informed of new arrangements, in due course. For all routine matters planned for April, please check whether these are to go ahead; do not automatically assume that they will be going ahead.

Events outside the church that have been cancelled or postponed are as follows: again, you may wish to check the situation, nearer the time.

The March Music Exams; the NELUM Meeting, on March 23rd; the March 27th Lunchtime Concert at Cross Street Manchester; Ainsworth's Anniversary Service, on April 5th; and the Annual Meetings, in Birmingham, between April 7th and 9th.

The Palace Theatre, Manchester, has suspended all its performances until the end of April, and possibly longer, so our proposed trip to "The Phantom of the Opera", on May 5th, has been cancelled; Roger has now issued refunds to everyone who had booked; thanks to him for the tremendous amount of work he has had to do---more than anticipated, and in difficult circumstances.

Further information, on all matters, will be given when it is available.

A message from our property manager:

Greetings friends,

It's a funny old time for all of us and there's no mistaking that; not just for those of us in the congregation, the church herself honestly feels a little glummer now that she's not filling her rafters with your glorious voices; she's a bit listless without the sound of clanking spoons in teacups, or laughter and joy in her halls. No organ music, no services and no children running along the sanctuary floor, she's feeling very quiet indeed. She genuinely feels lonely, and that's okay, because she isn't alone in that, right now I suspect we all are, but I am visiting her regularly and I am trying to keep her company, and I have promised that we will return and bring our glorious voices, clanking spoons and our laughter and joy.

In this time of self-isolation, it's important to remember that the virus we are isolating ourselves from can survive on surfaces for days, and on some surfaces, potentially weeks. Aggie and I are deep-cleansing the building ready for it to be open to all of you again. This makes it imperative however that we are all careful not to re-contaminate the building by going in too frequently and we continue to allow anyone working at the church to self-isolate by not dropping in unannounced. If you need to go into the church for any reason, I would really appreciate it if you could let Roger or me know in advance, so we can manage the risk both to you and to everyone working in the building appropriately.

I understand it's a liberty that I am taking here in making this request, but if we want to come straight back to our beautiful church as soon as the lockdown is lifted, we can only hope to do so safely if we manage entry and exit of the building from a central point of contact, so we don't risk reinfecting parts of the building as we go. Between us, Aggie and I will keep the building in good company as well as safe and secure.

I do hope you are all keeping yourselves safe, and that our wonderful church will soon be filled once more with your singing and joy.

Worshipping together

I hope that you are enjoying the service-at-home which is being sent out each week. If you know anyone else who would like to receive one, please let Kate know: there is no extra cost to adding them to the email list, but if someone would like a paper copy a contribution to church funds to cover printing and postage would be appreciated. (Church members are not, of course, being asked to contribute to this cost!)

As well as holding the service at 11.15 on Sundays from my kitchen table, I have started a practice of singing the Lord's Prayer at noon every day. If you would like to join me (even if it's only as and when you remember), I would be delighted.

Worshipping online

During the time churches are closed, several ministers and worship leaders are offering opportunities to worship together online. I have decided not to do this, as it would not be inclusive in a congregation in which so many of our members do not have internet access.

If you are interested in joining in a 'live-streamed' service from another minister, or in watching or hearing other services, please let Kate know and she can tell you which churches are doing this and when.

There are also several opportunities each week to join in a 'Heart and Soul' session, which is similar to the contemplative worship we used to hold at Bury: I have "attended" two of these online and they genuinely feel like worship. Again, please let me know and I will let you have details.

This may be a good opportunity to see the worship-leading styles of other ministers and other churches.

Church collections

Obviously, whilst we're not meeting together as a church, we won't be receiving collections, but I know that you will probably still want to make your regular weekly donation. If you are able to save up what you would have been paying each week, and then pay it in one go when we're back together (ideally by cheque or bank transfer) we would all be very grateful!

Food supplies

Please also bear in mind that Ade and I have made quite a lot of soup, and it's currently in the freezer in church. If you know of anyone who needs some healthy homemade soup (the current options are leek and potato or tomato, I think), please let me know: Ade has to go into church every three days to do security checks, and can collect a tub of soup for you.

If you are struggling with any other deliveries, please let me know straight away, and I will do what I can.

Worship Support Group Service:

On March 15th, we were privileged to have our service conducted by 4 members of our Worship Support Group: Val Chamberlain, Betty Kenyon, Damion Langford, and Marian Price. The service was entitled "Desiderata", taken from a 1920's prose poem, by American writer, Max Ehrmann, for which Susan Mitchell had provided the original inspiration [see overleaf]. Our Orders of Service informed us that "Desiderata offers many different ways to live a positive life", and the group stressed the importance of our spiritual requirements, which enable us to achieve happiness and peace in our daily lives.

This was a well-devised and well-presented service from an effective team, who are to be congratulated on their achievement. Amongst the themes was a reflection on giving advice: whether, when, why and how to do so, and which people are best-qualified, both in terms of giving and receiving it. Over-hasty reactions were considered, too; did you know that it takes 6 seconds to count up to 10? In this time, we can think before we speak and refrain from uttering words which are untrue, unnecessary, or unkind. The group had compiled a list of guidelines aimed at providing us with a good life, which we were invited to consider during a contemplative musical interlude.

Many thanks, once again to the members of our Worship Support Group; their high-quality services never fail to please.

With all its sham, drudgery and broken dreams, it is still a beautiful world.

Matters financial:

During the last few weeks, we, as a church, have raised a considerable amount of money which has been donated to charity.

The Quiz, held on February 20th, was organised by the Social and Fund Raising sub-committee, and raised £660.00---an excellent achievement! As previously agreed, half the proceeds were donated to church-funds, and a quarter each to Médecins Sans Frontières (suggested by Pam Oxley) and Hope for Justice (suggested by Abi Elliott-Mcguffie). Anne Mills paid the monies over, and acknowledgements and thanks have been received from both charities; these will be posted on the notice-board. Thanks to everyone who supported the event, and to the organisers, on the evening.

Church Council had agreed to replace "Liberty" with "The Woodland Trust"; this was suggested by John Fitzpatrick, who organised a year's subscription for the church; literature about "The Woodland Trust" is now in the lounge, for everyone to read. Thank you, John.

On March 1st, we were visited by Marta Pacini, Anand Ennis-Cole and Sri Ramana Devi, who spoke to us about a project to create a Peace Forest in Rawtenstall; this is being organised by The Shiva Trust, who aim to plant 500 trees there, and a matching number in other countries, too. The retiring-collection raised £142.50, which the church-officers agreed to top up to £200.00. Anne and Roger handed over our cheque when they attended Rawtenstall Unitarian Church's Interfaith Service, on March 15th.

Many thanks to all who contributed to the above worthy causes; we should be proud of ourselves.

Vice-Presidential Duties.

February 9th saw me at Newcastle, to conduct morning-service at the Church of the Divine Unity, in the city-centre; the church-premises are magnificent, and the worship-area will easily hold 600 people. Sadly, this space is far too large (and expensive) for the current congregation, who use a lower-ground room for their activities, including services, nowadays. The building is up for sale, a good offer has been received, and this is under consideration; if the transaction is completed, this would enable the congregation to remain where they are and to refurbish their smaller premises, whilst the remainder of the building will be transformed into an Arts and Theatre complex. We used our time in Newcastle to do a little sight-seeing and found that the centre is attractive and interesting, whilst coastal resorts, such as Whitley Bay and Tynemouth are very beautiful, even if Storm Ciara was raging!

By the following Sunday, I had travelled to Kendal, to attend the Formal Welcome to their new Minister, Rev. Amanda Reynolds. I gave the Greetings from the General Assembly, plus some thoughts on successful Ministry; I also wrote a report for The Inquirer, which was printed in the March 7th issue. Rev. Beryl Allerton conveyed the Greetings of NELUM to the congregation, and Val Chamberlain represented our congregation. The GA Chief Officer, Elizabeth Slade, was also present, and spoke about her work, and her life as a Unitarian. This was a wonderful service, on a memorable afternoon; Mandy was delighted with the event and quick to express her pleasure; she is an excellent Minister and already much admired by her congregation. I shall return to Kendal (hopefully!) at the end of May, to help them to celebrate their 300th Anniversary.

Unity, Bolton, was the next service I conducted, on February 23rd; I had been asked to talk about my year as Vice-President, so, using my calendar-pieces, I constructed an address for them. They were very pleased, and

even Roger commented on how interesting it had sounded---and he was there at the time!

After that, I attended services at Bury, in March, as I had no official engagements until the 29th; this included chairing the discussion of the GA Motions, on March 15th, after the service.

Unfortunately, Coronavirus took over, before then, and Ansdell and I were obliged to cancel the visit. My three Presidential visits in April have all been cancelled, too, by mutual agreement, and who knows where that will end? The cancellation of the Annual Meetings means that I will not be installed as the GA President, as I had expected, although I will assume my duties (if there are any!) from April 9th. The coming year, I suspect, will be different from what I had envisaged!

Dear all,

Well: these are certainly very strange times.

It's hard to imagine that just two weeks ago (at the time I'm writing this) we were only just starting to wonder if we might need to close the church for a couple of weeks, and that this time last week we received instructions from the government to say that we should stay in our homes as much as we possibly could.

It's been a shocking and fast-moving time. And the things that are happening are things we haven't ever experienced before: we've never before been instructed to stay at home, and we've never before been told we're only allowed one period of exercise a day. And it's very, very hard. It's been a massive change in our lives, and not a pleasant one.

But we do know why it's happening, and whilst I've never been someone who thinks the government is automatically right, on this occasion I am absolutely supportive of these rules.

There are people out there working incredibly hard, and putting themselves at risk to try to contain this awful virus, and the only way we can support them is by staying at home as much as we possibly can. If we've ever had a sacred duty to obey the rules, it's now, and I am so grateful to know that you are all abiding by the spirit of the law, as well as the letter of the law.

I have been genuinely humbled in the last few days (I can't believe it's only a few days!) by the expressions of concern for others which I hear every single time I phone one of you. Everyone is asking how everyone else is, and

it is no exaggeration to say that that lifts my heart in what can be very dark times.

I do miss you all, very much, already. On Sunday when Ade and I worked through the service-at-home (at the kitchen table), I got a bit weepy when we were singing the Lord's Prayer: I really missed singing it with all of you in church.

I hope and pray that before long we will all be back together in our beautiful building, seeing each other's faces and worshipping together again.

Until that time, let's be very grateful for our friendships, and for telephones, and let's remain together in our hearts and in our prayers: you are certainly all in mine.
