Second Sunday lunches: still experimenting, still changing!

Last month I said that I was thinking of reducing the number of Second Sunday Lunches and swapping two thirds of them for picnics: this idea didn't prove very popular, because the people who come for the pub lunches really value that.

So the latest experiment is that we will continue to go to a pub for lunch on the second Sunday of each month, and that when there is a fifth Sunday in any month (the next ones are October and January), we will have a picnic either at Holebottom or in the lounge, depending on the time of year, the weather, and people's preferences.

This may change again, of course, and if you have any opinions on how we should do this, or even if you'd like to consider a picnic or a lunch out every so often during the week, please let me know: one thing we've learned in the last couple of years is that it can be a blessing to have things 'up in the air' and that there is no harm in trying things and then trying them again in a different way if they don't work.

The next Second Sunday lunch will be at a pub (I think we decided on The Two Tubs, next to the Robert Peel), on Sunday 14th August.

Zoom coffee mornings: taking a break

The Zoom coffee mornings were really important to some of us during the lockdowns, particularly in those bewildering early days, but it's been several weeks now since anyone has turned up, and I think it's time to stop them.

I am really glad that we were able to run them, and that they provided something we needed at a very strange time in our lives, and I'm not in any way sad or disappointed that they are no longer needed: quite the opposite, in fact!

It might be that in winter people want to start them up again, and I hope that you'll tell me if so.

In the meantime the monthly Saturday Social Gatherings are going to carry on (in person), and if anyone has other ideas about ways in which we could come together socially as a community (either in person or online) I would love to help them bring those ideas about. As if by magic everyday life is made that little bit easier for us. As if by magic things that need to be done are done. As if by magic things that might otherwise not be in the right place appear where they need to be. The world has magicians, and it has millions of them.

From farmers working in the field, to truck drivers delivering produce, to the market stall holders who offer that produce to us, there is often a massive chain of people who provide us with services that we never see, and are not very often called on to appreciate.

With all that has happened over the last few years, there has been a breakdown in the supply chain and we have all likely started to see it in empty supermarket shelves and stories of protests from those working within the food chain.

I have mentioned this before in an earlier report from the building, when I recounted how hard it was during the lockdowns to acquire such items as wood, sand and cement for the most basic of jobs. The lockdowns have also taken quite the toll on contractors, who seem to have so much high paying work on their hands at the moment that the smaller jobs that used to be their bread and butter work is pushed further and further back, as the bigger, more costly jobs that disappeared during the lockdowns begin to take up all their time.

It's easy to argue that some of the magic is gone, and that is true because some of the people are gone. Many of the magicians we used to rely upon have simply stopped casting their magic.

This train of thought hit me again when I was shopping for consumables for the church. Prior to the lockdowns I would most often just go to one provider and buy stock in bulk because buying bulk made more sense. It's often a lot cheaper, and in the case of some of our consumables, bulk purchasing is the only method available to us. But because some magicians have stopped casting their magic, sometimes it's not the best, or cheapest option for everything we need. So now, it's not as simple as me heading off to one shop and buying the consumables, sometimes now it makes more sense for me to visit two or more stores.

In the past I also have tended to buy things like consumables using a basic just in time procedure, that is, I purchase the consumables when the bulk only purchases are threatening to run out. It makes the whole process a lot easier on me, and is cheaper for the church on the whole.

This will need to change however, as fewer magicians makes for fewer products in the supply chain. In the future I will need to start planning our consumables purchases on an as available basis, to ensure that we always have what we need. The consumables will still appear in church as if by magic, it's just that more magic is going to be done in house, by the magicians of the church.

And although I'm using my own work as a sort of case study here, it really isn't just going to be affecting me, everyone from the Trustees, the council, and the Minister, the flower arrangers, the coffee and tea providers and all manner of other church members do magic that may have to change as things move forward. We will, all of us, need to be doing more magic as the world around us changes and we take account for the ever decreasing number of magicians elsewhere in our supply chains.

So let us be aware, and grateful for the magic that we've had, the magic that will still be left in the world, however it changes, and for all of the magicians who work for the church, particularly those who perform their magic voluntarily, they may soon have to work some extraordinary magics just for everything around us to remain 'normal'. That we have so many magicians is a great blessing as well as a gift.

September Calendar

Worship:

Sunday Services

We continue to meet on Sundays at 11.15am to worship together (the service lasts around an hour and is followed by refreshments and conversation) and on the second and fourth Sunday of each month we also meet on Zoom at 2pm (the service lasts around half an hour, and you are welcome to stay for a chat afterwards).

There will be a Zoom service on August 14th. Kate will be on leave on August 28th, but will try to provide you with a list of other Zoom services which are available to you.

Inclusive Communion Services

We normally meet for communion at 12.30 on the first Sunday of every month, and everyone is very welcome to this short, inclusive communion, in which we share grape juice, bread, and community.

The next communion services will be on Sunday 7th August and Sunday 4th September.

Monthly midweek online meditations

We normally meet for meditation on Zoom on the second Tuesday of each month, now at 7pm

We will meet on Tuesday 9th August. Zoom details are in the centre pages.

Traidcraft

In January, this year, I announced my decision to discontinue my twicemonthly Fair Trade Stall. It has taken me until now to finish off all the associated paperwork and necessary "tidying-up", but the task is almost finished. In the store, at the back of the worship-area, the various large containers have been removed, leaving a very small amount of stock still to be sold; also left behind are quantities of tea, sugar and coffee, which will be used on Sunday mornings, and whenever else they are required.

If we are to retain our status as a Fair Trade Church, we must use, and promote, at least two fairly-traded items, as frequently as we can, and I hope that we will feel able to do this. Profits from the Traidcraft Stall have been used, since about 2010, to provide tea, sugar and coffee for church-use---the cost of doing this has amounted to approximately £250.00, each year, since that date, and the costs have been provided from the profits; current stocks, already paid for, represent approximately £54.00. I have now paid the remaining profits from the Traidcraft Stall into our Church Council account: a sum amounting to £443.32.

Thanks are due to Jean Brookhouse, who has helped me to run the stall, in the past, before lockdown, and, also, to everyone from the church who has supported the stall by buying items, large and small, during the past seventeen years. I offer my thanks, not only on a personal level, but on behalf of all those suppliers and producers of goods in developing countries; over the years, I calculate that we have purchased, on average, £2,000.00 worth of goods, per year, and the majority of that money (£34,000.00) will have gone directly back to those who need it most, where it will have been used and appreciated. These days, it is much easier to buy fairly-traded items, across the counter; please try to remember what life in developing countries is like, especially post-covid, and buy Fair Trade, occasionally. Thank you, all.

GDPR

It is time to renew our GDPR records to make sure that we have up-to-date details for people and so that we know what permission we have to share those details.

Sometime soon you will receive a form to complete and sign: it seems tedious, but it's really important so that we can remain in touch with you.

We're also going to be asking whether you'd like your name, address, phone number and email address included in a contacts list for the congregation: I would personally love it if you said yes so that everyone can stay in touch with each other, but your wishes will absolutely be respected if you would rather not be included.

It would be really helpful if you could complete the form as quickly as possible so that we can stay on top of our information.

Thanks to the generous donations made by members and visitors, the church has been able to reclaim a total of £1233.98 through the Gift Aid Scheme. This is actually an increase in the repayments from last year...all the more worthy of appreciation considering the increased challenges on all our purses.

Every penny that you donate, for which we have records, and meets HMRC's criteria, counts towards our claim. ...so every Smarties Tube returned, every coin in the bowl at Sunday coffee as well as all your other regular donations add up. So thank you to Marian, Brenda and of course Margaret Pollard and Roger Mills for your accurate record keeping. And a final thank you to you for providing information – whether filling in the (sometimes fiddly) information on the Visitor Donation envelopes or updating Gift Aid declaration forms – they might not be the most exciting pieces of paperwork you've completed this year, but they are like gold dust for the Gift Aid Administrator.

The worship resources now have a whole cupboard dedicated to them (the cupboard which used to hold books and candles); the candles and candle holders are now in the cupboard at the back of the worship area; and by the time you read this I hope that all the tablecloths (including the seersucker ones we use in the lounge) will be stored in one cupboard.

If you used to know where something was and now can't find it, please just ask. The only things I threw away were things which were definitely rubbish – including a tub of Bisto with a best-before date of 2013!

Autumn clear-up

Betty and I are hoping to organise a clear up day on one Saturday in September: those of you who remember clearing out the loft space will know that it was hard work but very rewarding. If you'd like to come and help, your reward will be unlimited tea and coffee, probably some cake, and a rich sense of satisfaction.

If you want to use it as a printer you'll need a computer (if Kate's in you can borrow her laptop just to print from), but it's already switched on if you just want to do some quick copying. If you're doing more than a tiny about of printing or copying, we would be very grateful for a donation for paper and ink.

Incredible Edibles at Stand Unitarian Chapel.

Our friends at Stand Unitarian Chapel in Whitefield have been running an 'Incredible Edibles' scheme at the field next to their chapel for a while now, and it is very successful. Around a dozen people, from the chapel and the local community, meet each week to grow vegetables, enjoy the fresh air, spend time in community and provide food to people in the local area who need it. In the last few weeks they have donated 25lbs of potatoes, 2lbs of peas, 11 cabbages and a lot of onions and lettuce to the local Homestart group: this is a very direct and immediate way of helping people who are in great need.

By Gone Times No. 27, by Betty Kenyon: The story of the Matthew Haygarth Memorial Trust Fund

Our church and our town are grateful to our benefactors of the past – the Unitarian industrialists who helped Bury to be the place it is today: the Wrigleys, the Grundys, the Holts and more besides.

The Art Gallery across the road was built specifically to house the fabulous Wrigley collection of paintings and works of art. In addition, there were generous monetary contributions to this congregation which have extended beyond the 19th century.

Matthew Haygarth was a British ex-pat living in Malta to where he'd retired after selling his quirky successful restaurant in Prestbury. He died on 4th February 1988 after a short illness. He is buried in Malta.

Matthew had family connections with this congregation and used to turn up on special occasions. His sister Violet Haygarth was married to Alex Rogers who was an eminent trustee here in his day. Alex and Vi, whom some here will remember had a son Anthony who was therefore the nephew of Matthew Haygarth. Matthew's will left the bulk of his estate to establish 'a residential home for the accommodation of elderly single persons' such home to be provided and administered under the auspices of Bury Unitarian Church. The legacy was £300,000. That's over one million in today's money.

You can imagine the frisson of excitement that ran through this church community when the news was announced and a board of trustees was established under the chairmanship of David Sayer who was Matthew's solicitor.

The problem was that the Unitarian movement had no organisation for establishing such a scheme and after much investigation, a partnership was forged between the trustees and the Manchester Methodist Housing Association. After much toing and froing, the disused Baptist Chapel in Ramsbottom was identified as a suitable building. By this time the fund had almost doubled to £600,000 thanks to high interest rates, the Halifax share flotation and a grant from English heritage of £100,000.

The chapel was converted to form twelve individual self-contained apartments which are popular with the residents – including our own Barbara Bamford and Jean Brookhouse.

Our church is always advised when a vacancy occurs. The building is now administered by Great Places Housing Association who meet with the Haygarth trustees twice a year where rents and service charges are agreed for the following year and any issues addressed.

The Unitarian contribution, thanks to Matthew, has been the provision of 12 beautiful apartments offering special financial and material advantages compared with similar types of accommodation available locally. Great Places have recently spent £230,000 on a complete refurbishment of the premises.

There is at present a vacancy on the ground floor. Neville Kenyon is now chair of the Trust. Please get in touch with him if you wish to know more.
