Letter from the Minister

Dear All,

Welcome to this final edition of the *Calendar* for 2022. I can't work out whether it seems like five minutes since I wrote the last Minister's letter for Christmas, or more like five years.

Firstly, I want to wish you all every blessing for the Winter Solstice and for Christmas: I pray that whatever it is you hope this season will bring, that is what you receive. We all want and need different things at this time of year: some of us want to worship and spend time in reverence; others want to party; others want to be with those they love; and others, I know, simply want to get through it and emerge into January. All of those desires are valid, and it's also entirely okay to want a combination of them, or to want one of them one day and something entirely different the next.

It has been another rich and full year at Bury Unitarian Church, and I have felt blessed and privileged to share it with you.

We have had, of course, sadness and loss as well as joys and celebrations, and it is really important to remember our sadnesses at this time of year where there is so much pressure to appear joyful. We have lost beloved members of our community, and I know that we are all holding in our hearts and our prayers those people who are facing their first Christmas without a loved one. Please know that this is a community where we support you in your grief and where you shouldn't feel anxious about sharing it with us.

It feels like this has been the first year for a while where things have been vaguely 'normal', after a really complicated and hard couple of years in 2020 and 2021. This year we have, I think, worshipped in church every Sunday, without seating restrictions and with the ability to sing out, including a few Sundays in May where I was off sick and everyone rallied round. I wonder if we'll ever again take those things for granted? I feel sure I won't – every so often, particularly when we sing the Lord's Prayer together, I am struck by how much we missed it when we couldn't do it,

and what a great blessing it is to be able to do so again. It certainly does seem to be true that you don't know what you've got 'til it's gone.

And as well as worshipping together, we've also continued to socialise together: our various social groups and gatherings are going strong, and I know that they help to strengthen relationships in the community. If you want to join any of our regular groups, please know that none of them are 'closed' and you will be made very welcome.

We've also welcomed new faces into our congregation: some regularly, some occasionally, and some maybe just for a short time. It's always lovely to get the chance to welcome people and we genuinely do have a reputation for being a warm, friendly, and welcoming congregation: that is one thing, among so many things in our church, of which I'm very proud.

I am very proud to minister to this community, mainly because I very definitely don't do it alone. One of my favourite quotes is "ministry is all that we do – together," and we definitely share the ministry of our church. Every time you set foot in the building, let alone every time you do a piece of work or organise something or suggest something or stop to have a word with someone or neaten something up or mend something or send something in to this Calendar, you are ministering to the rest of us, and maybe the individual action isn't always noticed, but the overall effect definitely is. This community belongs to us, however long or short a time we've been a part of it, and I'm not going to apologise for saying, again, that that makes me very proud.

Our next Calendar will be in February, so having started this letter with wishes and blessings for Christmas and the Solstice, I want to end by sending you my wishes for a 2023 in which there is more joy than sorrow, and in which we are able to share our strength and our love together, as we have done so well and for so long.

Worship:

Sunday Services

We continue to meet on Sundays at 11.15am to worship together (the service lasts around an hour and is followed by refreshments and conversation) and on the second and fourth Sunday of most months we also meet on Zoom at 2pm (the service lasts around half an hour, and you are welcome to stay for a chat afterwards).

There won't be a Sunday Zoom service during December: on December 11th we have our Carols by Candlelight service, and I think we all know what's happening on December 25th.

If there is a wish for it, there will also be a short communion service on Christmas Eve.

We generally hold an inclusive communion service on the first Sunday of each month, at 12.30 (after the main service). There will be a Communion service on Sunday 4th December, but not on Sunday 1st January. Everyone is welcome to this simple and sacred sharing of food, juice, and community.

Church building open (and warm) on Fridays.

As the weather gets colder, and as fuel prices continue to rise, please know that at least on a Friday we would love you (and your friends, and anyone you know who could make use of this) to pop in and keep warm here. The kettle is always on, and there will be biscuits. You are welcome to bring your lunch, your books, your knitting or any other hobby.

Please do spread the word about this.

If I am ever not going to be able to be here, I will try to arrange for someone else to open up instead.

Minister's schedule, December 2022

Kate will be working and available throughout December: amidst all the glories and the fun, Christmas can be a very difficult month and you may want to have contact with her. She will be taking little pockets of time off, but probably not full days and not to a regular pattern.

She will try to be in the vestry on each of the Fridays, but please watch out for emails and notices about changes to that.

Kate (and Adrian) will be taking time off from after the Christmas morning service until Tuesday 3rd January.

I am usually in the vestry between at least 10am and 3pm on Fridays, and if you'd like to pop in for a chat you would be very welcome: the kettle is always on.

Notes from the building

Simon and Garfunkel's 'The Sound of Silence' is a beautiful song, it's a poignant, symbolic representation of alienation. It tells of an oncoming wave of separation, a separation of the one from the all, a separation of each person from the whole of the people.

As a warning to us, as Unitarians, it can certainly be appreciated for that symbolism, but the idea contained within it, is also making itself a practical problem for our church in very real terms. Over the last few years we've started to struggle a little with the audio system in our sanctuary, and it's becoming an issue for more and more members of the community. People are finding it increasingly difficult to follow the minister during her services and as the sound becomes thinner and thinner the need for us to address this encroaching silence becomes ever more pressing.

A lot of the cause of the problems we have are to do with the age of the components that make up our audio system. While the speakers were built for the church, the amplifier that fills them with sound and, the hearing loop, look to me as if they predate it by a few years more. While this does mean they were built at a time when things were built to last, they can't really be expected to last forever, and sadly we can't just throw money at the problem and have it disappear before Christmas, our audio system is a very peculiar beast. It's a specialist set of kit, but if we just leave it as it is, the sound of silence might be all that we hear.

I've now replaced our second failing microphone in the sanctuary (with the one from the upstairs lounge) and by the time you read this, I'll have replaced all of the cabling which is starting to visibly and audibly crack at their connections. The background hum and lack of power may well be dealt with by the introduction of secondary speakers and from me borrowing the upstairs amplifier. This should be more than enough for everyone to be able to enjoy the coming Christmas services, because a service, like a song, is at its most poignant and least separating, when it can be shared by all.

Lifts to services and events

Please don't let transport be a reason for not coming to services or events: if there is something you'd like to attend but it will be hard to get there or back, please speak to Kate. This is always the case, but particularly for Christmas events which are important to so many people, and particularly in winter when it's a lot harder to get out. And do bear in mind that if Kate's picking you up or dropping you off, it means she can't be shifting furniture or tidying things, so everyone's a winner, frankly.

Name and address booklet

Those of you who asked to be in the booklet containing names and addresses of members and friends of the congregation should have received your own copy with your Calendar. Please remember that this has only been distributed to those people whose names are included in it, and shouldn't be shared with others.

Smartie tubes

For several years, Brenda Ainsworth has been organising the Smartie Tube collection: people are invited to take a (full!) tube of Smarties, eat the contents, and then, over the year, fill the tube with 20p pieces. This has resulted in a nice extra donation every year.

Brenda won't be carrying on with this in 2023, so unless anyone else has a desire to take on the organisation, we're going to let the Smartie tubes scheme lie fallow for a while.

If you do have any full tubes from this year, please could you let Brenda have them by Sunday December 11th, in time to get them counted by the end of the year.

Thank you to Brenda for all her hard work over the years.

News from around the district and the denomination

Unitarian Peace Fellowship Ukraine Peace Appeal

More than 200,000 Ukrainian and Russian troops have been killed.

Over 40,000 Ukrainian civilians have lost their lives and many more are suffering life changing injuries.

More than 13,000,000 Ukrainians have fled their homes, millions internally displaced and millions of others living as refugees.

Numerous homes, schools and hospitals have been damaged or destroyed. Water, electricity and other essential facilities have been badly disrupted. Landmines and other devastating weapons are killing many innocent civilians, including innocent child victims.

At least18,000,000 people in Ukraine are in acute need of medical care, food, water, heating and other essential humanitarian aid.

Right now the people of Ukraine are facing the worst disaster and Europe and the world as a whole our most dangerous political crisis since the Second World War.

Consultation on the new GA chalice design: a message from the GA

At the last Annual Meetings of the General Assembly of Unitarian and Free Christian Churches, held in Birmingham on 19-21 April 2021, the resolution below was passed.

Resolution: "That this General Assembly of Unitarian and Free Christian Churches regrets the lack of consultation over the rebranding exercise and requests that the Executive Committee (EC) consults the constituent congregations and fellowships on whether to introduce the new logo or retain the traditional Chalice Design adopted in 2007 in the interests of maintaining a consistent denominational identity."

Briefing Paper from East Midlands Unitarians:

"East Midland Unitarians comprises 8 Unitarian places of worship plus one active house fellowship. We have a strong and proactive district association meeting four times a year.

When the new chalice logo emerged, it became apparent at several district meetings that some representatives were perplexed and uneasy that the new image of our symbol had not received a proper consultation process with constituent Congregations and Fellowships which make up the General Assembly.

At the December 2021 Quarterly Meeting of East Midland Unitarians the unanimous view of the meeting was to submit the Notice of Motion to the April General Assembly Meetings for debate.

Members of East Midland Unitarians are united in their understanding that, in order to ensure confidence in denominational structures, an appropriate consultation should take place specifically to ascertain the view of the whole Unitarian Movement which makes up the General Assembly."

From the Calendar December 1889

The Annual Christmas Party will be held on Wednesday, December 25th.Tea at 4.30pm. Tickets price 1/-.

Report in January Calendar 1890 of the Christmas Party

There seems to be but one opinion as to the well-earned success of the Christmas entertainment. "The Ticket of Leave Man" is a capital play, full of bright and interesting dialogue, with pathos, action and fun.

Report in January 1908 Calendar of the Christmas Party

The Christmas party was held on Christmas Day 1907 when about 300 persons sat down to tea. The entertainment consisted of the comedietta, "Miss Honey's Treasure" followed by the drama, "Old Phil's Birthday".

Report in January 1912 Calendar of the Christmas Party of 1911

The party was on Christmas Day and tea was still costing 1/- again with entertainment.

The scholars' party was on 28th December with tea at 5 o'clock with entertainment to follow. Price of tickets—4d for children under 12years of age; 6d each for all other scholars and teachers; friends and members of the congregation over 14 years of age, 9d each.

Do you remember the Christmas Tree Festival that Betty and Molly organised for 4 or more years?

It was held on Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

We invited 39 local charities to be a part of this.

Over 23 decorative Christmas trees by local voluntary organisations.


