Notes from the building.

It should come as no surprise by now, that I truly love our church building. I do go on about it pretty often - usually to absolutely anyone who will listen and I've probably even lost friends over my constant warbling on the matter, but this is neither here nor there. I love it, and I'll sing that love from the rooftop of that very same building (don't tempt me, I probably will).

I get to share this love the most when we have bookings for the building. When we have visitors my love for the building is almost always reciprocated. From the joy of using the sanctuary for concerts, to the comfort of our downstairs lounge to the sheer scale and freedom of the upstairs hall, all of our spaces have had tremendous feedback regarding just how fortunate people feel to have access to the spaces we have available.

Since the pandemic and its related lockdowns, we've really struggled to find long term lettings for the building and while we have had more than a few one-off bookings, nothing has turned up that will bring in a consistent income. No matter how fond of our building people may be, lining up their needs versus making our space available is a very tricky tightrope walk for everyone involved to manage.

Very fortunately though, we've managed to negotiate that tightrope and a new lettor has started using our building regularly on Mondays. It's been so nice to see the building pop back into life on a day when the only regular visitor it usually gets is myself. My favourite part of successfully managing this for us however, has been that their love of our building has been as palpable as mine and that really should cheer us all no end.

There's more information on this booking elsewhere in the calendar, and bookings are now included in the what's on page, so long as those bookings are made in advance of its release.

Annual Meetings 2023: A report from Anne Mills

The GA's Annual Meetings were held, last month, in Staverton, near Northampton. We seem to be returning to pre-covid numbers, with well over 300 attendees, the atmosphere was relaxed and pleasant, and it was good to chat to the many people I knew, as well as making new friends. It was a pity that we had no Motions to debate, and, certainly, this contributed to a loss of focus in the Plenary Sessions; for my own part, having chaired the Meetings, last year, I would say that a free year gives us the opportunity, in the future, to select Motions carefully, and to assemble appropriate documentation that is concise and clear in its intentions.

I joined the Anniversary Service Choir, and found this enjoyable---although extra rehearsal-time would have been useful! I also enjoyed a "Sing For Joy" Workshop, led by Sue McFarlane, which reminded us how to use our voices properly---naturally, and without strain; the session was demanding, but refreshing.

There were three break-out sessions which I found valuable, the first of which was The Associate Members' Meetings; these are usually staid affairs, but this year's was more lively than usual, with good suggestions offered. Those present felt that we ought to raise our profile, by making a definite contribution to matters Unitarian; it was suggested, and this will be taken forward, that we might sponsor a three-year term of Residential Youth Programmes, at The Nightingale Centre, Great Hucklow. It was also felt that we might have a special hymn, to sing at our meetings, or that we might, as is our right, proffer a Motion, next year; I pointed out that, if we did this, we would have to ensure that we were prepared to give sufficient work to the project, so that it was successful. The subject of Associated Members' lack of voting-rights was raised, yet again---still a sore point!

I always attend The Women's League AGM, ably chaired, this year, by Susan Holt, who will continue as President, until April, 2024---a two-year term. Sue Toulson, of Upper Chapel, Sheffield, will succeed her. Susan Wildman received her Honorary Vice-President's badge---rather late in the day, as covid-conditions had prevented any earlier ceremony. The National Women's League has already collected £2,000 towards its nominated charity, Women's Aid, and this will continue as the annual charity, until 2024.

Sadly, it was reported that several of our branches had closed, and there are not, now, sufficient branches, country-wide, to support the district-system; it is taking time to recover from covid-restrictions, and we need to adjust accordingly. We are still financially-sound, and very active, in some spheres, but it is becoming increasingly difficult to appoint officers: Susan remains as National League Treasurer, as well as President; and Joan McFarlane, National League Secretary, is still being hampered by hip-pain, which will continue until her operation takes place. We ended on a positive note, however: in August, it will be 50 years since Margaret Barr died, and we hope to celebrate her tremendous work in India; many offers of help were received, and a zoom-meeting will be arranged, to harness all this knowledge and enthusiasm, into a special service, and, possibly, a worship-pack.

Of all the sessions I attended, one in particular remains with me: "Stories from the Pandemic", and I saw, from my notes, that I had written "so glad I went to this", on the page. Rev. Oscar Sinclair, of Lincoln Unitarian Church, Nebraska, realised, mid-2022, that all was not well within his congregation. Everyone was fatigued, uninspired, apathetic. He decided to mount a project, in which his church-members would share their individual recollections, and these would combine into a collective story. He was convinced that the trauma they were all suffering was harmful, because it underlined the helplessness they all continued to experience: from themselves, from their church, and from those close to them; this brought

gradual realisation of what had been lost. 92 people volunteered their stories; they interviewed each other, and this was transcribed and reported back to the congregation; a service, later, reinforced the stories' effect. These were not simple, ordinary tales, but harrowing ones; we learned of emotions laid bare, of devastation, of tragedy. I will never forget one woman's story: "My happiest day was when I legally married my husband." Then her voice changed and became tearful. "My saddest day was when I buried two of my children, who had died from covid; it's not natural for parents to pre-decease their children." Yet the story-telling was cathartic; it brought sympathy, empathy, and renewed congregational contact. Suppressing tragedy, failing to acknowledge facts, trying to forget: these are unhelpful, when what is needed is to show true feelings and discuss them. As the session ended, we left in silence, unexpectedly moved, too stunned to speak, our thoughts with that Nebraskan congregation (and all others like it). It's impossible to convey the effect of such deep emotion, in a few words, but covid has affected the whole world---an experience that has deeply disturbed everyone.

Thank you for allowing me the opportunity to share the experience of this year's Annual Meetings.


Unitarianism

"Thou shalt love the lord thy God with all thy heart and with all thy mind; and thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself."

If we add to these the Unitarian principle of the right and free inquiry as expressed in the words of the apostle, "Prove all things, hold fast to that which is good," and "Let every man be fully persuaded in his own mind," we have a pretty good statement of the Unitarian ideal.
