Letter from the Minister

Dear all,

In my last letter, I mentioned that things were never going to be exactly as they used to be and now, with the death in September of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth the Second, we have all experienced another change, and one which was, for some of us, bigger than we'd expected it to be.

Many of us have followed the queen since her (and our) childhood, and for some of us she is the only monarch we have ever known. Some of us are fond royalists and follow the royal family closely, and others, I know, are not monarchists. And yet we have all, I think, been affected by the news of the death of Elizabeth Windsor who was, as well as the queen, a mother, grandmother, and great grandmother.

And I know that for some of us, this – coming as it does so soon after the lockdowns and all of the difficulties and upheaval that they brought about – has just felt like too much. I can't make any of that go away, of course, but please know that I do sympathise with you, and I understand if you're feeling sad, depressed, bereaved, or even angry. Of course, we can always say, and we'll always be right, that there are people worse off than we are, but that doesn't mean that we're not going through something of our own as well, and it's perfectly valid to be upset on our own behalf.

I think that things and feelings will start to settle down soon: as I say so often, life is a cycle, and the death of the queen leads the way for the coronation of Charles III, and we can, perhaps, soon start to become excited by what changes the new reign will bring about.

And we are now, of course, very clearly heading into autumn: I'm writing this on the day of the Autumnal Equinox, that time of year where the day and the night are in perfect balance and where we turn from 'early autumn'

to 'proper autumn'. It's a time, perhaps, tinged with sadness, but also full of hope and expectation.

When you get this month's Calendar, we'll either be about to celebrate our Harvest Festival, or have just celebrated it. You may even be reading this in a dull moment in the sermon! The time of gathering in, closing in, drawing in, is sacred and important, and I hope that we can use these few weeks to centre ourselves and relax back into a balance. Harvest time is a great opportunity to be grateful for all that we have, as well as to remember those who have less. I hope that you can find some delight in these weeks.

As you'll read elsewhere, I will be away for much of October. My leave allowance has built up, so I'll be on leave for just over three weeks. Once I'm back I'll then be at a ministerial conference for a few days. As always, you can contact me if there's an emergency: I'll be away for some of the time (we're visiting Ade's parents more these days, and we've also planned a few days at Butlins in Minehead, thus fulfilling a childhood dream of mine), but whilst I'm at home you will be able to reach me *if you need to*. I know that you're all very good at knowing what is and isn't an emergency! Whilst I'm at the Ministerial Conference I'll be available: that's something I'm doing in work time. You'll find details of pastoral cover for the time I'm off later in the Calendar.

And once I'm back, we will be well into the comfort of our regular winter activities, leading from Remembrance Sunday through to Christmas.

I'll end my letter in the same way I ended the last one: things won't ever be exactly as they were, but we are always moving gently forward.



Parking

Sunday 25th December, 11.15am: Christmas worship, preceded by a light breakfast.
